U. S. COAL PRODUCTION

EGGS AND POULTRY IN CANADA

The following is taken from the Daily Consular and Trade Reports contributed by U. S. Consul Deedreiner, Charlottetown. In the last fiscal year Canada reported 164,835 dozen of eggs valued at \$44,111. Of these there went to the United States 39,917 dozen, to the United Kingdom 33,455 dozen, to Cuba 44,109 dozen, and to Newfoundland 20,947 dozen.
