

**FOR KING'S.**—To King's College, Windsor, belongs the distinction of being our oldest Canadian University and indeed the oldest in the overseas dominions of the British Empire. Straightened circumstances and war conditions have made necessary an immediate appeal for \$125,000 of which nearly \$87,000 has already been subscribed. Rev. Dr. Boyle, President of the College and Rev. Canon Vernon, Organizing Secretary of the King's College Advance Movement arrived in Charlottetown on Saturday, and commenced their campaign in Prince Edward Island by appeals from the pulpits of the two Anglican Churches of Charlottetown Sunday. The Rev. Dr. Boyle, President of King's College, Windsor, was the preacher Sunday morning at St. Paul's Church. He combined the celebration of Victory and Peace with an appeal for the College and for the educational work of the church. The war, he said, had been a mighty conflict in defence of ideals. It had been fought for the preservation of our national principles of Duty, Chivalry and Faith. Victory ought to mean a re-birth of those things. Reconstruction meant not material restoration as the former re-establishment of these virtues. In this moral and spiritual reconstruction one of the greatest forces was the university. It was the German university that had guided Germany into those false ideals which now have caused her downfall. Turning to the subject of the church university, he declared that King's to the utmost of her capacity taught the true virtues, "Man-


