

CZECH-HUNGARIAN FIGHTING FLARES A NEW

EVENTFUL WEEK IN EUROPE, IS BELIEF Several Clashes Reported Along Newly-set Border

CHAMBERLAIN WILL PURSUE APPEASEMENT

Will Stop Off At Paris Enroute To Rome For Conferences With Mussolini.

LONDON, Jan. 8.—(AP)—Europe entered today what may prove its most decisive week since Munich. Prime Minister Chamberlain, who will go to Rome for exploratory conferences with Premier Mussolini, will be the central figure in a week packed with negotiations.

EUROPEAN OUTLOOK:

Ukraine Looms Trouble Centre

(Editor's Note: Dewitt MacKenzie, Associated Press foreign affairs writer, has just returned to New York after a four month tour which took him through 14 European countries. He was a member of the staff covering the vital conferences in Germany which resulted in the dismemberment of Czechoslovakia. MacKenzie then continued his journey to the leading capitals affected by the developments. In the following story he outlines what may be expected this year as a result of foreign happenings. He writes with a background of 30 years' experience in the foreign field.)

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—About a month ago in Greece I consulted Delphian Oracle which for more than 25 centuries has foretold the fate of a man to whose toe took the pains to climb the steep path to the Temple of Apollo—way up among the "shining rocks" at the base of Mount Parnassus.

There, with the aid of a bent and wrinkled Greek who has spent so much of his long life digging among the mysteries of the ruins that he has become the spirit of the place, I learned of the future.

Offers Forecast

These ideas are not dissociated from the facts gleaned during the tour I have just finished through 14 European countries. Still, inspiration has come from Delphi and I intend to offer the following forecast from the foreign field for 1939:

Foremost in the minds of almost every one probably is the question of whether there is danger of a European war. The answer: We have every right to be optimistic. There is no prospect of such a conflict in 1939 than there was for 1938. There is possibility of an armed clash between Russia and Germany.

SHIP REACHES SOURIS AFTER EVENTFUL TRIP

Safe beside a dock at Souris last night the Norwegian freighter S. S. Karmoy was leading seed potatoes after an anxious day in drift ice off Point Prim.

For a second time services of the powerful icebreaking car ferry S. S. Charlottetown were necessary to free the freighter and send her on her way to Souris. The Karmoy and the C. S. Brant were caught in ice off Point Prim early Saturday after they were taken from the ice bound waters of Charlottetown Harbor by the ferry Friday night. The three ships left port here at 9:30 Friday night. The ferry remained with the ships until they were five miles west of Point Prim when she had to leave on return to Souris. The early morning trip between this Province and the east coast was a record.

The Karmoy and Brant waited until morning before attempting to pick up open "leads" in the ice, which in places were two feet thick. The day dawned however, fog closed down making it difficult to locate leads and impossible to check the ships' positions with the land. Finally both steamers hove to and a second call was put in for the S. S. Charlottetown. The powerful icebreaker reached the ice-bound steamers which were just east of Point Prim, at 7:30 yesterday morning and broke the way for two hours through the ice.
