LATEST WORD FROM HILLCREST MINE

Narrow escapes were many even though few in the danger zone of the explosion were those who a few seconds before were in the immediate vicinity of the death dealing instrument.

JAP CRUISERS COMING TO VANCOUVER

OTTAWA, June 20.—It is still expected in official circles that the shipload of Hindus at Vancouver will consent to return peacefully to their own country. The turn for which the Komagata Maru was chartered, expired on the 10th of the present month, and the vessel would have left Vancouver before now, but for the apparent disposition of the Hindus to prevent the sailing of the ship.

LARGE FUNERAL.

PARIS, FRANCE, June 20.—At the funeral of a chauffeur killed when the street collapsed 3,000 taxicabs were in line and held up the traffic for two hours.

SERIOUS FIRE IN SUSSEX, N.B.

SUSSEX, June 18.—Shrieks of burning horses, howlings of frightened cattle, rising above the roar of the flames, gave an added horror to the havoc wrought by the fire which yesterday afternoon destroyed two barns belonging to George W. Fowler, M.P., gutted a barn attached to the rectory of the Church of England, and for a time threatened the rectory and a number of other buildings. Mr. Fowler's loss will be over \$20,000, and he only carried \$4,000 insurance on the property destroyed.

THREATENS RECTORY.

A high wind from the W. S. W. swept showers of sparks onto a barn attached to the rectory, and it too was soon in flames. The rectory caught in several places and the furniture was hastily removed, but heretofore work on the part of the firemen, aided by a sudden shift of the wind to the N. W., saved this structure.

DENIED WOMAN A VOICE IN THE VESTRIES

LONDON, Ont., June 20.—As was the case last year, the Anglican Synod of Huron, in annual session here, again yesterday denied women a voice in the vestries of the church. A motion providing for the enfranchisement of women, so far as vestry deliberations are concerned, was introduced by John Ransford, of Clinton, but was defeated by the following vote— Clerical vote—7; against 46. Lay vote—55; against 37. A two-thirds vote was necessary.

YALE WINS BOAT RACE BY FOUR INCHES

NEW LONDON, June 20.—By the narrow margin of four inches Yale won the varsity four crew race on the Thames river, from Harvard, here late yesterday afternoon, after a struggle which will stand out as one of the greatest in the rowing history of the two universities.

24 PEOPLE REPORTED DROWNED ON EXCURSION

ST. LOUIS, June 20.—The River steamer "Majestic" on an excursion boat struck today and sank in ten minutes. Of 49 persons aboard, it is feared 24 were drowned. BIG LUMBER FIRE AT RIVERSDALE, N.S.

HALIFAX, June 18.—Fire at Riversdale Lunenburg County, yesterday afternoon, destroyed 200,000 feet of lumber, belonging to Nathan Veinot, mill owner and lumberman of that village. At one time the conflagration threatened the village, crossed the railway tracks consuming the lumber piles on both sides of the railway, held up the train from Middleton, and required the assistance of the Bridgewater Fire Department and two score men before it was put under control and finally extinguished.

IMPERIAL CRUISE OF IMPERIAL FLEET

LONDON, June 20.—A demonstration of British sea power by an empire cruise of the imperial squadron on the eve of the imperial conference, next year, is suggested by the Daily Telegraph as being because the problem of naval defense will form one of the main subjects of discussion at the conference.

PARTY OF HINDUS

OTTAWA, June 20.—Another party of Hindus says the report is being organized to come to Canada or the United States. It is thought, however, that the project has failed through because of the failure of the others to land.
