 A DISPATCH has been received from the Magdalen Islands stating that a large smoked fish establishment owned by W. F. Timmarsh of this city, and R. N. Cox, St. John's, was totally destroyed by fire. The loss will be heavy though the establishment was insured for \$5,800.

A VERY enjoyable time was spent, November 13, at the home of J. W. and Mrs. Learl, Crapaud, it being the fifth anniversary of their wedding day. After music and games, supper was served, which brought the evening to a close. The presents testified to the popularity in which the young couple are held.
 SCARLET fever has developed some twenty cases in Halifax. At the same time some disease was reported among the rabbits, large numbers of which are sold at this time of year in the market. A medical examination was made of the dead rabbit and two were found with post mortem indications of some disease like scarlet fever. Further examination will be made and on the result will depend whether or not the sale of rabbits shall be prohibited.

VICTORIA DIVISION, S. O. T., held its regular meeting last night in Wright's hall. There was a very good attendance despite the stormy weather. The literary contest was carried on. The W. P. Wm. Rowe, received an emblematic pin from Solomon Thompson, an old member of Victoria Division, to be given to the Captain of the winning side. This no doubt will be a stimulant to the contestants.

THE regular monthly meeting of the School Board was held last night at 7.30. The teachers' report showed the enrolment for the past month to be 1250, the average attendance 1098, the percentage 87, number of cases of tardiness 253, number of visits to parents 253, notices 77, cases of corporal punishment 17, below average in grading 71, one case of truancy. It was agreed that schools close for Christmas Holidays on Friday the 21st and re-open on Wednesday the 3rd proximo. The question of placing manual training on the curriculum having been brought before the Board it was resolved that "in view of the fact that the term is so far advanced the Board consider that it would be unfair to place manual training on the curriculum prescribed for certificate and the Governor General's medal for the current year, but intimate their intention of doing so at the beginning of the next scholastic year. The question of medical inspection of the schools was discussed and the following resolution was agreed to: Resolved—That in view of information possessed by the Board with regard to the sanitary condition of the schools and the state of health for some of the pupils attending the public schools, the Board is of the opinion that there ought to be a monthly inspection of each school, by a duly qualified medical man, whose duty it would be to inspect the schools and report to this Board on the sanitary arrangements, and the health of the pupils, and make such suggestions as may seem advisable, with respect to the same. Further Resolved that this Board respectfully recommend to the City Council the appointment of a medical inspector to inspect and report as herein before set forth, such inspector to be paid such salary as the City Council may deem sufficient.
