### Greyhound Sets Record

LEXINGTON, Ky., Sept. 29—(AP)—Greyhound, E. J. Baker's six-year-old flyer, lowered his own world's trotting record for the mile to 1:55 4-8 in a race against time here today.

The best previous time for a trotted mile was 1:56, which the "grey ghost" from Baker's St. Charles, Ill., stables set here in 1937 and equalled last Friday.

The mark was only a quarter of a second off the new world's record of 1:55 for both trotters and pacers set yesterday by Bill Direct.

The 49th renewal of the Transylvania trotting event was won by Boyne, a bay gelding driven by Dunbar Boswick of Old Westbury, N. Y. The 60th renewal of the Kentucky stake, oldest event in United States trotting annals, was won handily by Dale Hanover, owned by Eldridge Gerry of New York, in straight heats.

NEW YORK, Sept. 29—(AP)—On the strong right arm of Bill Lee the fighting Chicago Cubs rode to a crushing 10-1 victory over Pittsburgh Pirates today for a sweep of the three-game series and a 1-2-game lead in the National Baseball League pennant battle.

The husky Chicago righthander, pitching for a fourth time in as many days, set the Pirates down with only seven hits. Their lone run came as the result of four straight passes in the third inning, from the first inning in which the Cubs scored three runs largely through the wildness of Russ Bauers, Chicago took command—then surged on to a 10th straight victory in a seemingly unstopable march to the championship.

The Cubs, nine games out of first place five weeks ago and winners over the Pirates in close, dramatic contests Tuesday and Wednesday, scored 10 lustrous hits off four Pirate hurlers. It was Chicago's 20th win in their last 23 games.

After the Bucs scored their single run in the third, the Cubs pushed two more scores over in the fourth on hits by Rip Collins, Bill Jurges, Stan Hack and Frank Demaree.

They picked up three more markers in the fifth on as many hits and one of three Pittsburgh errors. In the eighth Chicago scored its final two runs on a single hit as John Rizzo made the second of his two miscues and Arky Vaughan contributed another boot.

Before the smallest crowd of the season of the Polo Grounds—1,190—the Giants took an easy 9-2 decision from the Phillies today behind the eight-hit pitching of Cliff Melton.

Mel Ott's 35th homer on base, sparked a three-run rally in the first inning, and then they batted around to shove their other six runs over.

Johnny Vander Meer got into some tight spots but held St. Louis Cardinals to seven hits and won his 14th victory 7-4 for Cincinnati Reds.

Vander Meer walked a total of six men, forcing in one run, and struck out only one, Johnny Mize, Cards' first baseman.

At Brooklyn, the Dodgers and Boston Bees split a double-header, the Bees taking the opener 2-1 and Brooklyn coming back for an 8-6 decision in the nightcap.

Deacon Danny MacFayden pitched a nine-hitter in the opener. The Dodgers clubbed Lou Fette for eight runs in the second inning of the nightcap and coasted in.

### Ontario Team Wins Honors At Golf Meet

(By Russ Munro, Canadian Press Staff Writer) ROYAL OTTAWA GOLF CLUB, Ottawa, Sept. 29—An Ontario outburst of Toronto women destroyed Quebec's hopes as women's interprovincial team champions of Canada and won the royal Canadian Golf Association field for the third time in five years.

Ada Mackenzie's magic putter set some of its charm and she took a 32 on the second round of the 36-hole medal match, nine over par three-under-par 73 for the first round, but Ontario put to rest an aggregate gross score of 68, two strokes better than the Quebec foursome that held the title for the past two years.

The Maritimes' representatives, still unable to fathom Royal Ottawa's tricky course, finished sixth with 79.

It was Miss Mackenzie's sensational first-round score which gave the Ontario team the four-stroke lead after the first 18-holes yesterday and enabled it to snatch the victory even though it was outscored 334 to 338 this afternoon.

In the first round, Ontario had 32 and Quebec 336.

British Columbia was third with a total of 721 and Manitoba faced fourth with 724 strokes. An inter-sectional team composed of four western players was fifth with 739.

With a total 36-hole score of 155, Miss Mackenzie was the medalist with Mrs. W. C. Fraser of Ottawa, member of the Quebec team, runner up with 162.

The Maritime team ran into grief all the way and only Maisie Howard of Halifax was able to keep up with the field at all. She put together 83 and 92 for 185.

Barbara Trites of Bridgewater, N. S., was next with 192, adding a 6 to her first round 97. Two strokes behind came Dorothy Holmes of Truro, N. S., who took 90 today. M. J. Chisnut of Fredericton, with rounds of 108 and 111, ended with 219.
