THE HARVEST EXCURSION.

The departure of about six hundred young Islanders to the wheatfields of the Prairie Province yesterday morning is an event worthy of comment. Brawn and muscle and industry are among the not least valuable assets of the garden of the Gulf. And we venture the opinion that the Island quota of harvesters will found fully equal as an effective force in the fields as any like number drawn from any other part of the Dominion or from foreign lands. Those of the number who have not before visited the western Provinces will obtain a better and a broader view of the greatness of the Dominion than they could possibly obtain had they remained at home. Whether they return or not the lesson will be of value to them and to the country.

Our Islanders are both a loyal and industrious people, preferring the flag and institutions of their native land to any other and preferring to lend their brain and muscle to building up Canada rather than a foreign land. Good wages await them in the prairie harvest fields, and good land for settlement should they choose to make their homes in that flourishing part of the Dominion. Doubtless a number of them will locate there permanently and, while sorry to part with them, if they can better their

circumstances by remaining we shall have little cause to regret their going. When Americans by tens of thousands are crossing the border to take up farms on the Canadian prairies the intending exodion from Prince Edward Island can make no mistake in going to the Northwest rather than to the United States. We are glad to know that Manitoba has so plentiful a harvest as to need thousands of helpers to gather it in. We are glad that we have a great Canadian railway that has the enterprise to give them transportation thither at so low a rate. And we ask of the Northwest farmers who are needing help to give these young men a fair show in every way—good wages and good treatment,—resting assured that their skilled labor will be especially valuable. We believe they will give a good account of themselves there as Islanders have done everywhere, the equals of the best, whether in the college, in professional life, on the battlefields of South Africa or in the peaceful labors of the harvest field. From those that stay in the Great West we shall be pleased to hear from time to time, and should they wish, as they doubtless will, to hear regularly from their Island home. The Guardian's frequent visits can be readily secured as the best possible medium of supply for that particular want.

Premier Balfour lost a supporter by the recent election of an Opposition member in North Leeds, and now Cathcart Wason, Unionist member for Orkney, has gone into opposition on the Educational Bill. There will probably be others to follow Mr. Wason's example.

The Montreal Witness says that evidently the Cabinet is at odds about the fast line. Mr. Blair has been quoted as believing that an 18 knot rate of speed will be sufficient. Mr. Fisher has declared for 18 knots and Sydney as the terminal. Mr. Tarte favors a much higher rate of speed with Halifax as the winter port and Quebec as the summer port. Mr. Tarte has always to be reckoned with. The other day at a banquet at Fort William he jocularly made reference to his position in the Cabinet: "They call me the master of the administration, he said, "and in this way," he acknowledged, I am. There are twelve at the council table, and I am the spender of the whole gang."

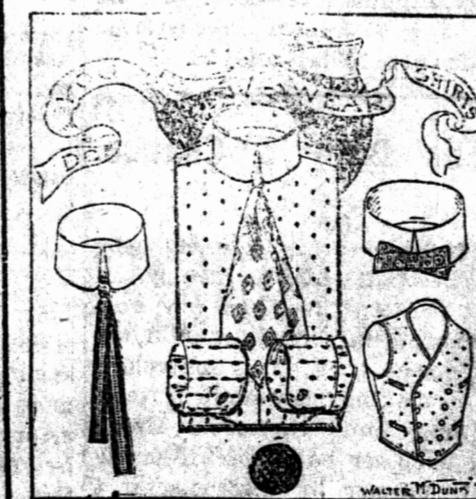

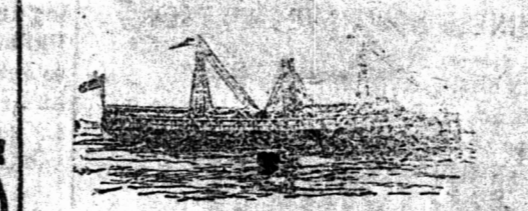
