The Tryon Sash and Door Factory is progressing favorably under the supervision of its new manager, Mr. John Ives. Business is certainly rushing his way.

The Hampton Dairying Co. intend putting an addition of 20 feet to their factory on account of the large increase in the quantity of milk supplied. Messrs. Ferguson and Beer have the contract for the work.

Mr. JOHN T. McFARLANE, who has been home attending the funeral of his father, the late Alexander McFarlane of South Melville, intends returning to Boston next week. Mr. McFarlane does a large contracting business in Boston, Mass., where he has resided during the past ten years.

Work was commenced on the new hall at Hampton on Monday the 16th inst, and the frame is now up and the greater part of it boarded in. The building is 47 feet long by 29 feet wide and when completed will greatly improve the look of the village. The work is being superintended by Hampton's hustling carpenter Mr. John French.

Mr. D. McDonald has been hired to take charge of the Hampton factory for another year. In this the directors are fortunate, as the quality of the cheese and butter made by Mr. McDonald last year was unsurpassed by that of any other factory on the Island, and in the discharge of his duty he has given the greatest satisfaction.

THE Toronto World, April 20, says: The Presbyterian cannot much longer ignore the tide of public opinion that is raising in opposition to some of the fundamental doctrines contained in the Westminster Confession. One Presbyterian divine after another is protesting against the doctrine of predestination and eternal damnation, as contained in the Confession. The list of dissentients contains the names of such celebrities as Drs. Briggs, Swing Hills, McGriffert and Gregg. And now, Dr. Parkhurst makes a break, and comes out flat-footed against one of the cornerstones of the Confession. Last Sunday the Rev. gentleman delivered a sermon from a Presbyterian pulpit, in the course of which he made this startling declaration: "Our own doctrinal prospectus advertisers as believing that little children, perhaps the babe at your bosom, is damned, already damned, damned before it was born, damned from everlasting," to which he adds that he prays "that the time may be hastened when this libel upon the infinite grace of God shall be erased from our records." The declaration will undoubtedly have the effect of bringing the question at issue to a crisis. The church as a body will have to face the music, and decide whether predestination and eternal damnation are or are not identified with Christianity. We think we are disclosing no secret when we say that not one Presbyterian in ten believes that the theory of predestination is consistent with Christianity. The doctrine may be theology, but it is not Christianity. The great majority of Presbyterians and Christians generally are of the same opinion as Dr. Parkhurst. The idea of "eternal damnation" is a libel on the infinite grace of God, and before long the Presbyterian church will be forced to free itself of this monstrous doctrine.
