### Hamilton Team Wins Round 5-4—Will Meet Hawks in Semi-finals.

TORONTO, March 25.—(Canadian Press)—A one-goal series between New Edinburgh suffered on their own ice had caused their elimination from Allan Cup senior hockey playdowns today and resulted in Hamilton Tigers occupying a place in the Eastern Canada final.

In spite of his two goals, Blake was forced to concede the spotlight to Peterkin, whose spectacular saves during the second and third periods kept his team from being routed. Peterkin floundered about stopping shots from every conceivable angle with every part of his body and it was his brilliant work that inspired his team mates and resulted in the improvement as the game progressed.

### Horton Smith Triumphs In Augusta Golf Tourney

AUGUSTA, Ga., March 25.—Picking up where he left off in Georgia four years ago as the last man to whip Bobby Jones in open golf competition, Lanky Horton Smith of Chicago paced the professionals to a smashing triumph over the former world champion today in the final round of the \$5,000 Masters Invitation Tournament.

Smith, leading from start to finish in the four-day battle over the beautiful Augusta National Course, rose to the emergency, with his chances at stake, by holding a 10-foot putt on the 17th green for a birdie and won the tournament from blonde Craig Wood of Deal, N. J., by a one-stroke margin. Smith, with successive rounds of 70-72-70-72, finished four under par with a total of 284 and captured \$1,500 first money. Wood, called "Sandy" and collected \$800.

An even dozen professionals, the entire "money list," finished in front of Jones, who kept the banner flying nevertheless by scoring another round in even par 72 despite a bad start, and winding up with a total of 284, 10 strokes behind the flying Smith.

Another leader to fall to land among the prize winners was C. R. "Sandy" Somerville, the former U. S. and Canadian amateur king from London, Ont. Out of competition all winter, "Sandy" struggled in today with a 71 to finish with the lofty total of 311 for the 72 holes.

### Black Hawks And Maroons Advance To Second Round

### Hard Battle Staged By Canucks With Morenz Out Of Game—Rangers Lose On Home Ice 2-1

CHICAGO, March 25.—The Chicago Black Hawks fought their way into the second round of the Stanley Cup playoffs tonight, but only by holding Montreal's courageous Canadiens to a 1-1 tie in a battle that went 10 minutes and forty-five seconds overtime, before 17,500 spectators at the Chicago Stadium.

Fighting without Morenz, who went out of the game with a fractured right wrist after playing only about three minutes of the second period, Canadiens staged magnificent battle to turn back Chicago time after time after Joliat had given them the lead in the first period. Joliat's score evened the total goal series at three all, and the next goal meant life in the playoffs. Chicago batter-ed Joliat almost almost without intermission, but with the help of Bourgeault, Mantha and Burke, he stopped everything until March took a pass from Thompson in the overtime to hit the winning counter into the cage.

Canadiens had a chance to score an upset triumph shortly after the overtime period started when McFadyen was sent to the penalty box with a major assessment for charging Burke into the Canadian cage, while he was in, the Frenchmen called up everything they had and fired it at Chuck Gardiner, but couldn't beat him.

NEW YORK, March 25.—Montreal Maroons, who barely succeeded in getting into the National Hockey League play-off, tonight blasted the New York Rangers, 1933 world champions, right out of the battle for the Stanley Cup by winning the final game of their opening playoff series 2-1. Maroons took the two-game round by the same score as they played a scoreless tie at Montreal last Thursday in their initial clash. The victory sent the Maroons, who finished third in the League's Canadian division with a considerably lower point total than the Rangers scored to gain the same notch in the United States section, into the semi-final round.

Earl Robinson, a real native of Montreal, proved to be the deciding factor in the evenly contested struggle which kept a capacity crowd of more than 15,000 on edge. The speedy youngster scored both Montreal goals in a great comeback after the Rangers had evoked the opening counter of the night. The speedy passing backs that caught the Rangers flat footed.

The Rangers scored their only counter soon after the start of the second period by giving an opening session that was devoted largely to careful defensive play. Three successive plays by Vic Ripley and Cecil Dillon finally bore fruit when Dillon tore down the side of the rink, drawing both Montreal defenseman off to his side, and hipped a pass to Ripley, who was left unguarded in front of the cage. A penalty to Earl Siebert, Ranger defenseman star, paved the way for Robinson's first tally but he was back on the ice when it was scored.

### Two Straight

With two straight triumphs behind them, both scored on Toronto in the Red Wings moved into Detroit to finish the series. They need only one more win to clinch the series and qualify for the Stanley Cup finals while Toronto would have to win Monday, Wednesday and Friday to reach the cup stage in the third consecutive year.

### Detroit White Stars Win U.S. Amateur Hockey Title

NEW YORK, March 25.—(Canadian Press)—Sweeping through their opponents as will, the Detroit White Star Athletic Club today defeated the Metropolitan All-Stars of New York 5-1 to win the United States amateur championship and the right to meet Canada's Allan Cup winners for the North American title. The series is scheduled to be played in either Toronto, Ottawa or Montreal next month.

A speedy, smooth-passing team, the White Stars clearly outplayed their heavier rivals before 10,000 fans in the strenuous wind-up of the three-day play-offs.

The Detroiters are the first western team to win the title in the three years the United States Amateur Athletic Union has conducted the tourney.

Atlantic City Seagulls were ineligible to defend their two-year title because of the ruling that all players must be United States citizens. The White Stars comply with this rule although most of them are Canadian-born.

The Hawks, fresh from their convincing victories over the McCall Red Raiders, are top favorites to take the Bengals and any opposition they may meet in the finals whether it be the Thundering Herd or Kimberley Dynamiters.

It looks as if the coveted trophy would reside in the Maritimes in tonight's second successive victory. That is a feat that has only been accomplished three times in the history of the trophy. Winnipeg's Maroons did it in 1911 and 1912. The Grants, numbering such star players as they came in and out of the National Hockey League, winners like Hootley Smith and Jimmy Monroe, made a double in 22 and 23, and Port Arthur performed some heroic feat in '25 and '26.

They backeyed it is that old sports "They can't come back." It must be very real to Bobby Bentley today as the Atlantic conference fails to see nearly as good as the leaders in the Masters' tournament at Augusta. Jones, who considered the greatest player of all time, returned to competition last week, nearly a year after his great season of 1930, when he won four major titles, scored 76. That was four above the course and six strokes over the tally of the leader.
