Knapp. After showing a steady decline for the last ten years, the birth rate dropped 5 per cent in the first quarter of 1931 over the corresponding period last year. On the other hand, the death rate advanced 3 per cent.

AUXILIARY TO ORPHANAGE HOLDS MEETING

The annual meeting of the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Protestant Orphanage was held yesterday afternoon at the Canadian Legion Rooms with a large attendance. Mrs. J. A. Macmillan who was in the chair presented the annual report outlining the work done by the Auxiliary during the year. The secretary's report was presented by Mrs. W. G. Bruce, and the treasurer's report by Mrs. W. M. Rowe.

President's Report

The following was the report of the year's work presented by Mrs. J. A. Macmillan: The Charlottetown Ladies' Auxiliary of the Protestant Orphanage has just completed another year of successful activity on behalf of the children of the Mount Herbert Orphanage. The schemes for raising money were practically the same as in former years, except that a bazaar and tea was held rather than an amateur play. In August the sale of artificial flowers on the Tuesday of Exhibition week was quite successful. Although the weather was disagreeable an enthusiastic band of ladies gathered at Holman's store to receive their allotments and soon the city was bedecked with Orphanage flowers.

In October a successful Rummage Sale was held in the Nash Showrooms on Lower Queen Street. The Auxiliary are very grateful to Mr. Currie, Manager of the Nash Motor Sales Company for the use of his spacious showroom for the sale.

The Annual Street Collection was made in November. The campaign to raise funds for the Prince Edward Island Hospital had just finished and the ladies were rather dubious as they started on their Orphanage collection. However,

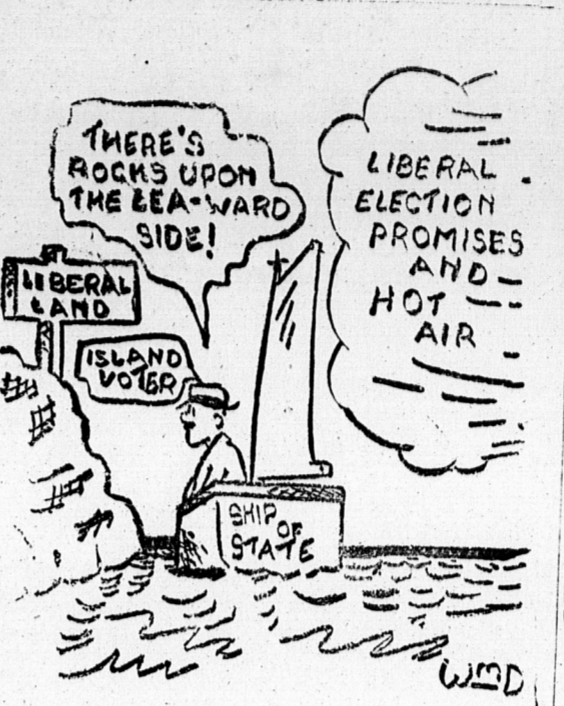
the returns showed that the collection was even larger than in former years and the Auxiliary members are very grateful to the generous public who were so ready to respond to the Orphanage appeal. Many ladies have said that it is always a pleasure to work on the Annual Street Collection for the Orphanage because the people are so ready to give to such a worthy cause.

The Bazaar and Tea in Zion Hall on March 5th was well patronized and the Treasurer's Report shows that the ladies were well repaid for their work. Again the public showed its goodwill toward the Orphanage by their generous gifts for the Tea and Bazaar.

These four money-making enterprises carried out by a small band of women were the means of raising over \$4,300.00 for the Orphanage.

Apart from money-making, the Auxiliary Ladies have had a very real interest in the children themselves and have always enjoyed Miss Beers' interesting reports of the work done in the Institution. In September last an organized visit of the Auxiliary members and friends was made to the Home and a shower of sweaters was given to the older children accompanied by
