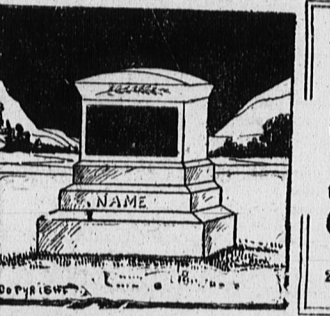

CO-OPERATIVE WOOL SALE.
The third annual co-operative sale conducted by the Department of Agriculture for the Sheep Breeders' Association has just been concluded with most gratifying results. About 25,000 lbs. of wool were graded and sold at an average price of 70.28c or according to the following rating:
Fine medium clothing, 73 cents per lb.
Medium combing, 73 cts. per lb.
Low medium combing, 70 1/2 cts. per lb.
Coarse and lustre, 67 1/2 cts. per lb.
Rejects and black, 60 cts. per lb.
Locks and pieces, 56 cts. per lb.
Tags, 50 cents per lb.

Such prices as these can only be obtained when the wool is handled by a co-operative method and graded according to quality. For comparison the prices received for individual lots throughout the province ranged from 40 to 82 cents with a large portion of the lots selling for 50c. and slightly over. The prices realized for the co-operative sale exceeded all other sales in Canada by over 6 cents per lb.

Probably the most noticeable effect of the work is the improvement in the method of handling. The fleeces are kept separate and are properly tied. They also exhibit more care in feeding during the winter as the wool for the most part is free from dirt and straw.

Following the sales of other years there has been a strong movement toward the improvement of the flock by the introduction of new blood. Much improvement has already followed the use of pure bred does on the average grade flock, both from the viewpoint of wool and lamb production.

It is to be hoped that the sheep breeders of the province will continue to exert every effort toward the building up of the industry which is needed at this particular time. Improvement and co-operation pays.
