I like to take a few practice swings in the grove, but I really want to save myself as much as possible for actual competition. My theory about the practice tee is that you're apt to lose your ability to concentrate and get swinging too mechanically if you spend too much time there.

The ability to concentrate at all times and with all sorts of distractions is the most difficult part of playing high pressure golf. Now, I suppose, somebody will question this theory by pointing out that putting requires considerable concentration and will require you to let your mind relax to weaken your powers of concentration. The same doesn't hold true on the putting green. The object is to put the ball into the hole with the fewest possible strokes and with such an objective you're not apt to lose your concentration and start putting mechanically.

Practice makes perfect, but don't overdo it. I've talked with Walter Hagen on this same subject many times and he says that you can save yourself for your matches by practicing too many shots on the practice tee. Somebody once said that the reason I didn't spend as much time on the practice tee as the other boys was that I was superstitious and that I didn't want to waste my good shots there. What they had in mind, probably, was the old superstition among ball players that there are only so many good hits in a bat and that it is foolish on that account to loan your bat, even your buddy's, to anyone when you do you are giving concentration is broken.
