There are nine of these offices, at the following centres: Halifax, for Nova Scotia; Saint John, for New Brunswick; Charlottetown, for Prince Edward Island; Montreal, for Quebec; Toronto, for Ontario; Winnipeg, for Manitoba; Regina, for Saskatchewan; Calgary, for Alberta; and Victoria, for British Columbia.

The interim certificates are being sent to the Assistant Receivers-General, and these will be delivered to subscribers, pending the engraving of the permanent bonds with the interest coupons attached.
