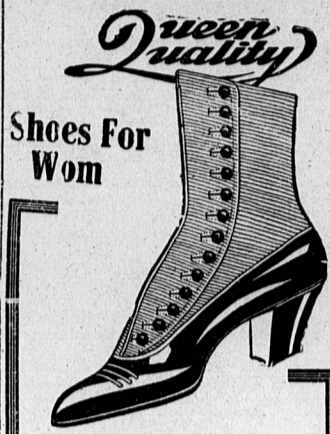

The latest news, first of all.

Today's Guardian comprises twelve pages of news matter.

Miss Lottie Smith, Montague, was in the city yesterday.

Mrs Lemuel Ross, Cambridge, Mass., is visiting friends in Vernon River.

The offering taken in the Tryon Baptist Church on Sunday last in behalf of the Campbellton fire sufferers was thirty six dollars.

Rev. James Donahoe, formerly of Cardigan arrived in this city from St. Paul, Minn., recently and will visit with friends in this province.

J. Gordon Ross, who has been spending the past month with Island friends, left on return to his home in Dorchester, Mass., yesterday morning.

Miss Catherine McLean, Montague, was in the city yesterday, having arrived the previous evening from St. John, where she attended the exhibition. She returned home in the afternoon.

In Hartney Hall, Friday, Sept. 16, at 7.30 p. m. the Rev. E. E. Styles will give a lecture on Twelve Years Experience in the West Indies. Admission fifteen cents, children ten cents.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Sarah McNeill, who died early yesterday morning, will take place this afternoon at one o'clock from her late residence, 197 Cumberland Street, to the cemetery at West River, (Shaw's)

Mrs Beaton and six children of Whit Road Cross left yesterday morning for British Columbia where Mr. Beaton has been for some years in the employ of the C. P. R. They were accompanied by Master Malcolm McKinnon of Brooklyn. Mrs. Beaton is a sister of Donald McKinnon of this city and of Daniel Martin and Murdoch McKinnon of Montague the latter of whom accompanied the party to Summerside.

While Miss Annie Welsh was returning from St. Joseph's Convent on Monday afternoon last she was run into by a bicycle rider and received a bad shaking up, being stunned for some minutes. The little girl with her chum, was just at the corner of Pownall and Kent street when the accident occurred and was carried back into the convent. It is claimed that the rider gave them no warning of his approach. Accidents of this kind should make riders a great deal more careful in ringing their bicycle bells when crossing streets etc.

The funeral of the late Peter Hapenny, City, took place yesterday from his late residence to St. Dunstan's Cathedral where the solemn Requiem Mass was sung, the Rev. Maurice McDonald officiating. There was a large attendance of mourners and friends of the deceased and his family at the funeral and many floral tributes were offered, among them being offerings from the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers and the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen. The pallbearers were: Hugh Connors, John Parkman, W. W. Walker, from the C. M. B. A. and R. A. McDonald, W. O. Darcy and George S. Ryan from the B. R. T.

Speaking of inventors a correspondent writes: B. Harry McAvish of Eldon has at last discovered a series of perpetual motion. This is the stickiest piece of ingenuity out yet. The device is driven by gun shot which is fed from one hopper to another, twice in every revolution, the shot is therefore everlastingly traveling like that of sand glass. The device is now built on a small scale and found to work well and a large one will be made and its power tested on a revolving churn. The power is slow, but strong, as the points are tipped with lead. The larger one will receive more attention from the inventor as the gun shot will be counted and weighed into equal parts in order to have an equal balance on the bottomless hoppers. The small motion has been running in an airtight room for forty-eight hours. Several drawings have been made and will be forwarded to different patent attorneys and the device will at once be protected before it comes too widely known. There is no company of inventors over this device as suspected by some people. Mr. McAvish claiming to be the only inventor and now depends on his own merits alone to submit same to best advantage. The device is cheap to build and will drive any machinery and if good patents are now obtained the device will no doubt render fame and fortune unlimited to its inventor.

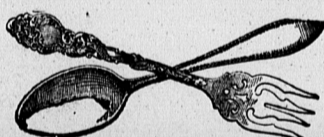

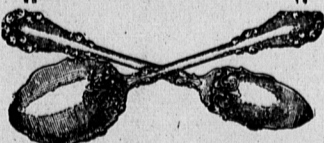

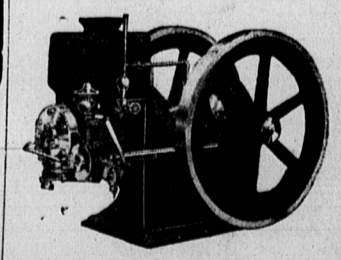
