**Believes There was  
A Conspiracy  
Against Squires**

(Canadian Press.)  
ST. JOHN, Nfld., Jan. 31.—Wit-  
nesses for the prosecution held the  
floor throughout today's session of  
the Royal Commission hearing the  
charges against Sir Richard Squires  
former Prime Minister of New-  
foundland. Proceedings opened  
with the resumption of cross exam-  
ination of L. R. Curtis, law partner  
of Sir Richard, by Hon. W. R. War-  
ren, Attorney General of the Col-  
ony and Premier. His continued  
day and part of the after-  
noon sitting and established that  
close relations existing between  
Mr. Curtis and J. J. Miller, former  
accountant for the British Empire  
Steel Corporation at Bell Island,  
even after charges had been laid  
against Sir Richard Squires and  
his sister Mrs. G. L. Har-  
Miller and her sister Mrs. G. L. Har-  
Miller, former accountant and secre-  
tary to the ex-premier, had been  
subpoenaed by the Crown to give  
their evidence.

Mr. Curtis told in detail of his  
revision of the statement Miller  
was to give in evidence at the hear-  
ing and asserted that he had out-  
lined, in this connection, certain  
information from Sir Richard  
Squires. He declared he believed  
L. J. Miller and J. T. Mooney were  
partners in a conspiracy against  
Sir Richard.

Late in the afternoon, Mrs. Har-  
Miller was recalled and, under ex-  
amination by the Attorney General,  
stated that the amount of forty dol-  
lars per month she received from  
Sir Richard Squires after leaving  
his office, was for his maintenance  
and not in respect to her insurance  
activities as had been previously  
stated in evidence.

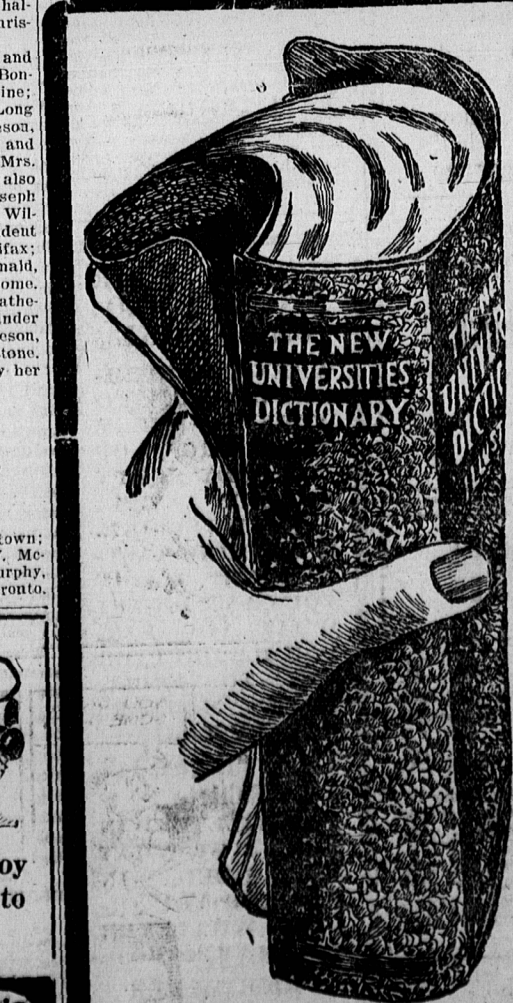
