DEATH OF MR. PROWSE.

The death was announced in yesterday morning's GUARDIAN of Mr. William Prowse, the sad event having occurred shortly before the paper was printed. The deceased gentleman was in his 69th year. He had never fully recovered from an exposure two years ago at a fire in his premises at West Upton, Mass., where he resided. Mr. Prowse was born in this Province and resided in the Royalty, but some eleven years ago removed to Massachusetts. His failing health induced him about a year ago to return to his native land. For a time his health seemed to improve but more recently there was again a decline. His last serious illness was brief and he was only confined to his room for four or five days previous to his departure from life's activities. The deceased was a much respected member of the Methodist church and was sustained by the consolations of religion down to the last. In politics he was a Liberal. In earlier life he took an active interest in the militia and was for a number of years officially connected with No. 1 Company of the 82nd. He had many friends and was highly esteemed in all the relations of life—a good citizen, a devoted husband and an indulgent father.

The immediate surviving relatives are a widow, eight sons and three daughters. Two of the latter, Mrs. Burhoe and Mrs. Goldsmith of Boston, were hastily summoned when Mr. Prowse's illness became serious, and fortunately reached his bedside in time to exchange loving greetings before the end came. Mrs. William Crabbe of California is another daughter. The sons are Messrs. J. E. Prowse, M. P. P., B. C. Prowse and W. B. Prowse of Charlottetown; Robert W., Chilliwaak Valley, B. C.; Albert S. Sydney, C. B.; Stephen G., Chelsea; Artemas F., Chelsea; and Cornelius J., West Upton. THE GUARDIAN joins with the entire community in extending sincere sympathy to the bereaved family and relatives.

The Toronto Mail and Empire publishes a despatch from Brockville which tells of arrests made in connection with the late by-election there. One Antonio Wendling, hotel proprietor, was arrested charged with giving a fraudulent ballot to an elector. Another party stands charged with attempting to pass a fraudulent ballot on which the deputy returning officer's initials were forged. It is affirmed that other fraudulent ballots were used, and if so it is most earnestly to be hoped that the guilty parties may be brought to justice.

The esteemed Patriot had a particularly "bad spell" yesterday in dealing with THE GUARDIAN. The young man who controls the editorial columns says he wished to approach us with respect, as was quite proper, yet he made his advances, once with "most respectful difference" and the next time "with the utmost deference. 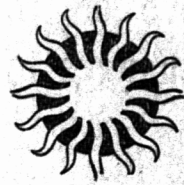
