

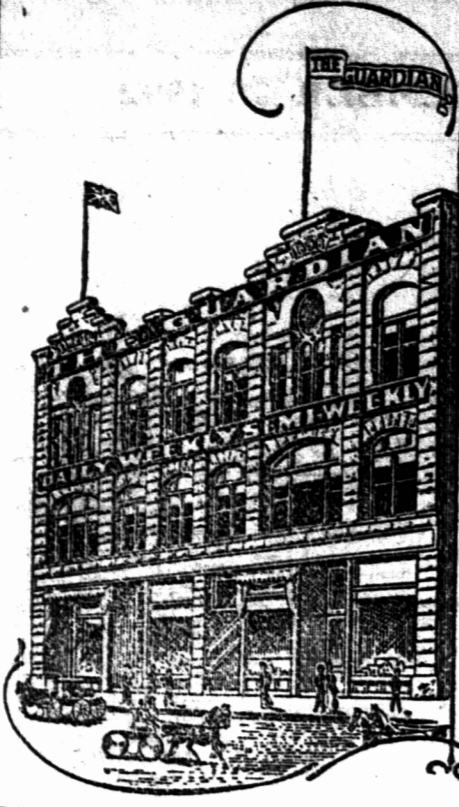

THE FRUIT MARKS ACT.

The increased production and growing importance of Island fruit renders it important that our growers should be thoroughly conversant with the legal requirements in regard to the packing and marking of fruit packages. The law is designed to protect the honest grower and packer, to enhance the value of our fruit products and to punish fraud. The Act is being enforced and the inspectors appointed to execute its requirements have been instructed to do their duty. No one honest in his endeavors and straightforward in his trading need fear any of its clauses.

The principal sections of the Act provide that every person who by himself or another packs fruit for sale in a closed package shall cause the package to be marked with the initials of his Christian name and his full surname and address; with the name of the variety or varieties of the fruit, and with a designation of the grades for fruit of the first quality No. 1 or XXX; for fruit of the second quality No. 2 or XX; and for fruit of the third quality No. 3 or X. It will be noticed that only closed packages need be marked. A closed package is defined to be a box or barrel, the contents of which cannot be seen or inspected when it is closed. Baskets, berry crates or berry boxes with veneer covers are not considered closed packages and do not require marking. Cranberries and all wild fruits are no subject to the provisions of the Act.

What is meant by No. 1 or first quality of fruit is described in the sixth section of the Act as follows: "No person shall sell, or offer, expose or have in his possession for sale any fruit packed in a closed package, upon which package is marked any designation which represents such fruit as of No. 1 or XXX, finest, best or extra good quality, unless such fruit consist of well-grown specimens of one variety, sound, of nearly uniform size, of good colour for the variety, of formal shape, and not less than ninety per cent, free from scab, worm holes, bruises and other defects, and properly packed."

There is no special definition of grades No 2 and No 3 but penalties are provided for selling or offering for sale any fruit packed in any package in which the faced or shown surface gives a false representation of the contents of such package; and it shall be considered a false representation when more than fifteen per cent of such fruit is substantially smaller in size than, or inferior in grade to, or different in variety from the faced or shown surface of such package.

Merchants are held responsible for the fruit they offer for sale (or fruit in their possession for sale), but the original wrong doer, if found, will in every case be prosecuted. The penalty for a violation of the law with reference to packing and marking is not less than twenty-five cents and not more than one dollar per package; for removing an inspector's brand, forty dollars; for obstructing an inspector \$25 to \$500. The fines are divided equally between the informant and the crown.

Inspectors are given large powers under the Act to enter premises for the purpose

of making an examination and to detain shipments of fruit for the same purpose. The packer, however, is amply protected by the stipulation that immediate notice must be given by the Inspector to the packer when fruit, which at all times is at the risk of the owner, is branded or detained, and the Inspector who exceeds his authority is subject to a heavy penalty.

Montreal Witness says "Mr. Tarte" has practically taken by the throat the Government which took him in as a reformer and has declared his intention to smash the party if it does not move his way." It would be startling but not surprising if he recanted his errors and returned to the fold, for though his body may be in the Liberal camp his soul is with the Conservat v. s."

The Evening Telegram of St. John's says there is no strong feeling in Newfoundland in favor of confederation. "The masses do not think their condition would be very much improved under Confederation, and hence the tardiness to make a change in our political system. Of course we cannot say what effect tempting offers from the Ottawa authorities would have; but, certain it is, they would need to be much more alluring than any that have yet been held out to us. It is a great thing to be independent!"

The Boston Traveller of the 22nd instant tells that the retail dealers there have advanced the price of coal to \$15 a ton. The charitable organizations are in dismay. Last winter they expended \$100,000 for fuel for the poor. Now the price of coal is double what it was last year. Soft coal, coke and wood have advanced in price along with hard coal and because of the great strike. Wood is selling at \$8 to \$8.50 per cord. And unless the coal strike is soon ended it is felt that there must be a further advance in the price of fuel, coupled with an insufficient supply at any price. What this means in the way of hardship and suffering can only be imagined.
