Rev. Edward Bell, of Petitediac, who has many relatives in this Province gave his celebrated lecture "A Trip through the British Isles" at Point de Bute, last week.

The Campana arrived in port at 10.30 Saturday morning from Montreal via Summerside. She brought a large cargo and took away a large cargo of potatoes and other produce.

A most enjoyable evening was spent recently at the St. Andrew's parsonage, with Rev. and Mrs. Lodge, formerly of Grace church, Charlottetown. A fine program was rendered and a generous collection taken for mission purposes.

A. A. Gillis who has been representing the Earle Co. Ltd., in Glace Bay for some time, has gone to Lakeville, P. E. I., where he resumes his position with the Lakeville Dy. Co., Mr. Gillis is a prominent member in the farmers club circles of that place who will no doubt welcome his return.

In the Sunday school at Chatham, of which Rev. G. A. Sellar, a native of P. E. I., is pastor, Decision Day was observed recently with much profit. Earnest preparation for it had been made for several weeks. Decision cards were given to the scholars, and quite a large number were brought in already signed. From the different classes about 70 have expressed their decision for Christ.

There was a gratifying display of bunting on Sunday and yesterday in honor of Victoria Day, and the Union Jack is showing up more prominently than of yore. This is the proper flag to fly, and it looks very well, except when it is as old and faded, as for instance was the one over the Provincial Building. The flags on the Postoffice and the Court House offered a pleasing contrast.

The body of the sailor, Wm. Gilfoyle, aged 22, of Lunenburg, N. S., the young man who was drowned in harbor last November, from his father's schooner, which was then in harbor, was recovered on Sunday morning. It will be remembered that the schooner was anchored off Connelly's wharf, and young Gilfoyle, who was mate of the vessel, was knocked overboard by the main boom hitting him as the schooner was being got ready to sail. His father, who was Captain of the schooner, made every effort to rescue his son, but the unfortunate young fellow was so encumbered with his winter clothing and long sea boots that he quickly sank and was carried away by the tide. Capt. Gilfoyle waited some days and employed a number of boats in the effort to find the body but failed, and it remained in the water till Sunday. It was first seen by some sailors who were out rowing and they towed it in to the Marine Wharf, when Marshall Cameron was notified. The coroner was called but did not think an inquest necessary as the body was recognized by Wm. Batt who had met the deceased before his death. The clothing on the body also corresponded with a description left with Mr. Batt by the dead man's father. The body was then removed to Davison's undertaking rooms where, although it was terribly decomposed, it was made ready for burial. In the evening a funeral service was held by the Rev. Mr. Woodroffe, and the remains followed by a number of sympathizers, were laid to rest in the People's Cemetery.

The Rev. A. W. Nicholls of Kensington is leaving on Thursday to attend the Pan Anglean Congress in London, Eng., sailing from Montreal May 30th per S. S. Southwark. Mrs. Nicholls and daughter will spend several weeks visiting relatives in Halifax.

On Sunday morning the Sons of England of this City held their annual parade, and attended divine service at St. Paul's Church. There was a very creditable turn out of the members of the Order and the procession was headed by the band of the Fourth Regiment.

Passed peacefully to rest at Quincey, Mass., on May 12th 1908 Norman Gillis, aged 83 years formerly of North Rustico. Four daughters and one son are left to mourn the loss of a kind and affectionate father. In early life he united with the Christian Church and remained a faithful member until death. On Sunday the 17 inst funeral services were conducted by Elder D. Crawford in the Christian Church New Glasgow, after which the remains were laid to rest beside his beloved wife Janet, daughter of the late Wm. Arthur.

On Saturday night the police made quite a seizure of liquor in the stable and barn at present used by Michael O'Brien, Grafton Street. There was in the lot a case of flasks of whiskey, nearly a score of three half-pint bottles of whiskey; a barrel of bottled beer and a small quantity of porter. It is not charged that the liquor has been sold on these premises but it is supposed to have been stored there and supplied to another place that has been disposing of the liquor. The seizure was very delicately timed, and doubtless was the means of eliminating the liquor from the bill of fare of some who cannot celebrate holidays without having something strong to drink.

Saturday, Sunday and yesterday were three days on which Victoria Park had many visitors. It is a beautiful spot just at present, with the trees breaking into leaf and the signs of spring abundant on every hand. People seem to appreciate this splendid appendage to Charlottetown and to enjoy its beauties more than in former years.
