(Continued from Page 1) increase in potato shipments from 189 cars in September, 1946, to 119 cars last month is not wholly explained by the 80-per-cent crop this year, as compared to that of 1946, nor by the slight increase with respect to box and refrigerator cars, for so far, the Canadian National Railway has been able to meet all reasonable demands for cars. It may be that the dealers' requests to the potato growers not to "press" a steady market is partially responsible for the decline.

"I therefore appeal again to Mr. King to face up to the realities of this situation. I ask him and his government to give the Canadian people a constructive lead in this most urgent and critical matter. Such action now is long past due."
