A Toronto despatch says:—"Party politics should never have been allowed to enter this question and people who have any real love for their country will be glad to see such a question as the Ne Temere decided in a manner little calculated to arouse the baser passions of the people." Speaking to The Telegram, Rev. Father Burke, editor of the Catholic Register, gave his views on the recent introduction into the House of Commons on the marriage bill. "No body has yet been aggrieved, over the workings of the Ne Temere decree," he continued, "and the province has civil laws which cover the marriage laws of that state."

"What else could the Borden Government do." He stated in reply to a question as to his views on the action of the ministry in referring the marriage bill to the Privy Council. "They couldn't pass the bill, and I very much doubt if any legislature would care to pass it. This country has a constitution which it must abide by. The only means of interfering any vague or deep clauses at its disposal is to go to the courts, which Premier Borden intends doing. If the courts approve of the bill, then it is time enough to take action."

"Of course the Catholic Church will proceed upon its own way, and if we run counter to the laws of the land, then we must suffer for it. In matters of conscience no church people will permit civil law to encroach upon them. Why today there are other civil laws which are being disobeyed every day. Take for instance the deceased wife's sister clause. In England, even the bishops of the Established church refuse to recognize it, and rightly so." Father Burke closed with the statement that if the state interfered with the realm of pure theology, that churches with religious principles will have to efface themselves entirely.—(Rev. Father Burke is a native of this province.)
