

REVIEW OF 1927 HARNESS RACING IN THE MARITIMES

Seventeen Maritime Province Records Were Reduced. Fifteen at Fredericton And Two at Charlottetown. Average Speed Faster Than Ever Before Known At Maritime Meets.

HALIFAX, N.S., Nov. 11.—James W. Power, Sporting Editor of the Halifax Acadian Recorder, in issuing his 39th Annual Review of the Harness Racing Season in the Maritime Provinces, shows a continuation of extreme speed that has developed in this province in recent years. Not only are many changes required in the record table, but there were keen contests, good fields, large attendance, a general display of interest in the meetings held at various places, and an average speed such as never known before. This was aptly illustrated at the fall meeting at Fredericton where, with classes ranging from the free-for-all to the 2.55 trot and pace, a total of thirty-seven heats were trotted or paced from 2.04 3-4 to 2.16 3-4, an average of 2.10 3-4. There were quarters in 30 1-2 seconds, with the last eighth in 15 seconds; halves in 1.01 1-2, three heats from 2.04 3-4 to 2.06 3-4; nine heats from 2.07 to 2.09 3-4, a total of twelve heats better than 2.10; and but two heats slower than 2.15, all on a half mile track. Seventeen Maritime Province records were reduced the year, fifteen at Fredericton and two at Charlottetown.

The Maritime Province race record was equalled by the roan mare Ruby P., owned by S.A. Wothens of Fort Fairfield, Me., and Billy Keys of St. Stephen, N.B., who, driven by the latter won the free-for-all at the Fredericton fall meeting. Bessie McKlyo, 2.01 1-2, driven by Hammond, Woodstock, N.B., and John Willard, won the first heat in 2.07 3-4, Ruby P. the second in 2.06 3-4, the third was declared a dead heat, Peterkin, 2.10 3-4, owned by G.W. Rice, Fort Fairfield, Me., and driven by Fred Cameron, won the first and second heats in 2.07 3-4 and 2.07. The latter won the fastest mile made in a race by a gelding during the season, and the 2.07 3-4 by Hedgewood K, the fastest by a stallion.

The fastest mile by a Province bred stallion was by the pacer Bill L., owned by W. Rivers, Herbert, and driven by George at Charlottetown, with his second heat in 2.15 1-2.

The fastest trotting stallion of the year was Longest, 2.06 1-2 won and driven by Peter Conroy of Charlottetown, when he won the first heat of the free-for-all at Summerside on July 1 in 2.15 3-4.

The best mare, La Bingen, owned by Safford & Greenway, St. John's, N.H., with her mile at Fredericton in 2.14 1-2, was the fastest trotted by a new performer. The fastest four year old pacer of the year was Beau Dillon, owned by A. Albright, Jr., Newark, N.J., and driven by Fred Kingsley. He covered the mile in 2.12. The fastest mile in a race by a green horse among Province bred, either trotter or pacer, was 2.15 3-4, made by Johnny Miles, trotter, owned by Dr. J. O. Calkin, Sackville, N.B., and driven by E.B. Avery, made at Houlton, Maine. Hal Tipton, owned by A.T. Hinton, Bathurst, N.B., and driven by E. Brown, made the fastest time by a green mare, Province bred, at Chatham, N.B., when he won the second heat in 2.18.

Directum Abbe, driven by John Willard, made the fastest mile of the season by a three year old in a race in 2.18 1-2 at Woodstock. Harry Putnam, 2.07 3-4, owned by H.A. Kitchen, Fredericton, paced the fastest mile of the year by a gelding at Fredericton on July 1, when Tommy Raymond drove him a mile in 2.06 3-4.

Lambert Todd, 2.02 1-2, owned by McKinnon and McKenzie, Truro, lowered the track record at Halifax to 2.09 3-4 in a trial against time. He also lowered the record at Yarmouth to 2.12 1-2. Aubrey the Great, owned by C. Annis, placed the Aylesford track record at 2.14. Emotionless, 2.08 3-4, owned by LeBlance, Salmon Lake, P.Q., gave Bathurst, N.B. a new track record of 2.13 3-4. Rose Waltz, owned by James Hennessy, River Herbert, lowered the record at Tatamagouche to 2.14 1-2. Miss Canada the Great placed the record at the new Track at Selmah, N.S., at 2.21 3-4. Acaciaville, owned by Wellington B. McNeill, Summerside, reduced the track record at St. Peter's, P.E.I., to 2.18.

Thirty-five regular meetings were held during the season, as well as seventeen matinees. There were 27 heats, trotted or paced, from 2.05 3-4 to 2.34; sixty-two from 2.10 to 2.14 3-4; one hundred and sixty-seven from 2.15 to 2.19 3-4; one hundred and eight from 2.20 to 2.24 3-4; sixty-three from 2.25 to 2.30. A total of five hundred and one heats.

Thirty-five horses entered the 2-30 list, and it is noteworthy that almost one third of these were sired by the Nova Scotia Government stallion, Captain Aubrey, 2.07 3-4. Eleven of his get already in the list, reduced their records. Forty-seven horses, previously in the list, attained new records, or sixteen more than 1926, the largest number ever known in the Maritime Provinces, with miles from 2.04 3-4 to 2.23 3-4.

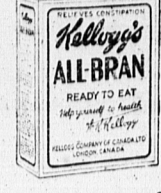

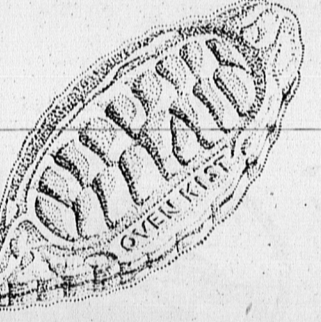
