Many mourners followed the cortege to St. Joseph's Church where Requiem High Mass was offered up by Rev. Father Mullins, after which interment took place in the cemetery adjoining.—North Sydney corres.

FOUR new sleeping cars for the I. C. R. have arrived at Halifax from Chicago. The cars are of the latest design and are the best style of the Pullman Company. Each car contains twenty berths and two staterooms. The Pullman sleepers are named after the last four Governor-Generals of Canada, namely, Stanley, Aberdeen, Minto and Grey. In addition to the sleepers there are two new dining cars. These cars will run on the road between Montreal and Halifax.

THE Khedive and the Bible Society. His Highness the Khedive of Egypt has accepted a copy of an Arabic Bible in three volumes from the British and Foreign Bible Society as a memento of its Centenary. His Highness, on receiving the presentation, expressed a hope that the Society met with every facility for its work in his country, and emphasized his appreciation of the good being effected through its agency. His Highness has since forwarded a large autographed portrait of himself to the Bible House in London.

A Guardian correspondent writing from Assinabola says: It has been a cool, damp season. The sun has not shone a whole day, unclouded, for some months. Cricket is a favorite game among the Englishmen here. Potatoes are very scarce and cost as much as \$1 per bushel. Cents are discarded, all business being done in 5c, 10c, or 25c pieces or in bills. Meat and flour cost about the same as on the Island but sugar and tea are a little higher. The barbers charge high prices such as 25c for a 1 1/2 cut and druggist's sundries are also dear.

All day yesterday a search was kept up for the bodies of the missing young men, Edward Weatherbee and James Johnston. Many boats engaged in the search but there was difficulty in locating the exact spot where the men went down and also a probability that the receding tide had swept their bodies further out. Yesterday evening dynamite was used in hope that the explosion would raise the bodies to the surface but it was of no avail. It is now doubtful if they will be recovered for at least some days. It was reported that the young men had been drinking before the fatality. This was in a position to state is false and an injustice to the memory of the dead. Efforts in searching will be continued today. Relatives will not arrive from Nova Scotia till some definite results are secured. Rev. G. W. Schurman, of North Sydney, an uncle of Weatherbee, was present yesterday assisting in the search. The town has offered a reward of \$50 for their recovery.—Sydney Record.
