FACED THE JURY AND STILL HE SMILED

Young Higgins Put on Trial at St. John for the Murder of His Chum—No New Evidence, Court Room Crowded.

ST. JOHN, Sept. 16.—Calm and composed, though his weeks of incarceration have told on him physically, Frank Higgins, the 15 year old slayer of William Doherty, his companion, entered the court room at 10 o'clock this morning to be tried for his life. He looked about the big room with his wonted unconcern, viewed the judge searchingly, took in the crowd, smiled to a few friends and cast a glance at his grey haired mother, who sat inside the rail in tears.

Though newspaper reports have said young Higgins was bearing up wonderfully well in health and spirits, his facial appearance to-day denoted unmistakably that he had undergone weakening in body. He looked quite worn and nervous. Judge Landry ordered the Clerk to proceed with the selection of a jury by ballot.

This procedure took quite a while, the vast crowd in the room surging against the rails in impatience.

Daniel Mullin, K. C., appeared for Higgins and Scott E. Morrill for Goodspeed, aged 14, who has been indicted as an accessory after the fact, in other words withheld all knowledge of the crime, which he witnessed and tried to escape with Higgins to the States. Goodspeed was not brought into court today.

The Jury was completed this afternoon and Hon. A. W. McKeown addressed it on behalf of The Crown. The young prisoner remained unmoved throughout the proceeding except when Mr. McKeown was giving details of the horrible crime when he smiled at one or two of the incidents connected with it. Three witnesses were examined but nothing now was elicited.

THE TORONTO GLOBE

ON HON. J. I. TARTE

On the Other Hand Tarte Has His Opinions of the Globe.

TORONTO, Sept. 16.—The Globe this morning publishes an editorial on Hon. Mr. Tarte, in which it says: Only unsympathetic and unromantic people would seek to bind Mr. Tarte by traditions and usages which govern ministers of the Crown in a British community. If he is not the master of the administration, he is the articulate organ thereof. All the King's horses and all the King's men could not restrain his eager enthusiasm and exuberant energy. His action is easy and incessant. He could run for 365 consecutive nights with a change of bill at each performance. If he were ever unhappy it would be when the curtains were down, the lights out and the audience disposed for sleep or refreshments. He is his own advance agent, his own bill poster, his own scene-shifter, his own miracle worker. He is always ready for the major part and for half a dozen of the minor parts if any of the performers are ill or missing.

In conclusion, the Globe says:—"The cabinet will probably still determine the general policy of the Canadian Administration. Ministers who have been superceded on the platform may still have something to say in the council."

MONTREAL, Sept. 16.—Hon. Mr. Tarte shown the Globe editorial, replied by saying: During the electoral campaign in 1900, it spoke in support of the liberal cause, and Hon. Mr. Mulock was the only liberal candidate returned victorious out of fourteen seats in and around Toronto. The Globe represents influences which, for a long time, have been hostile to me. It is astonishing to me to see how some people refuse to notice and accept the true condition of the public mind.

The Finance chairman reported having secured two thirds of the number of sustaining members' subscriptions and it was resolved to complete the canvas for the remaining three hundred and fifty dollars at once. We trust the citizens of Charlottetown and others of our Island will avail themselves of the opportunity of assisting in the work for young men in our City.

WILL ACT AS GUIDE FOR BOERS.

(Montreal Star.)

OTTAWA, Ont., September 16.—When the Boer delegates arrive in Canada, the best farming districts in each province probably will be shown them. There is a prospect that Mr. Moore, of the Department of Agriculture, will be appointed to accompany them on their tour. Mr. Moore has a thorough knowledge of Canada and its resources, such as would make him an admirable guide, and, moreover, he has spent two years in South Africa. The duty of selecting the points to be inspected in the several provinces it is likely will be left to the local authorities.

The gentleman referred to above is W. W. Moore a native of Charlottetown and now of the staff of the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, where he has been since 1897. Mr. Moore was at one time City Editor of The Guardian. Since his connection with the Department of Agriculture Mr. Moore was sent to South Africa late in the fall of 1900 in connection with the shipments of supplies from Canada for the Imperial War Office and also to study the possibilities of the South African market for Canadian products. Mr. Moore is now spending his holidays in this city with Mrs. Moore, who is also a native of Charlottetown. They leave on return to Ottawa to-morrow morning.

KRON PRINTZ WILHELM

BREAKS THE RECORD.

NEW YORK, September 16.—The North German Lloyd steamer Kron Printz Wilhelm, which arrived in port this morning, from Bremen, Southampton and Cherbourg, set all previous westward records. She left Cherbourg at 9.10 p. m., on Wednesday, September 10, and arrived at the Sandy Hook lightship at 4.07 a. m. morning, making the run of 3,047 miles in five days, 11 hours and 57 minutes, at an average speed of 23.09 knots an hour. The time is twenty-six minutes better than the time of the Deutschland.

HOW FAR NORTH HE WENT.

Peary with Henson, four Esquimaux and six sledges, started north from Hecla, April 1st, and got to 84 degrees, 17 minutes when the ice became impassable.
