ARREST OF SEVERAL WEALTHY AND PROMINENT MEN IS EXPECTED

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—Arrest of several wealthy and prominent men on charges of conspiracy to violate the federal authorities here today as a sequel to the capture of the schooner Henry L. Marshall, off the Atlantic City shore Monday night with a cargo of liquor on board. Members of the crew it was intimated, had given the authorities important "leads" concerning the financial sponsors of the Marshall and the other rum runners which are said to have plied between the Bahama Islands and the United States coastal three mile limit. The captain and mate of the Marshall escaped in a swift motor boat, leaving four members of the crew on board.

United States the governments of these countries beset with industrial strife with strikes and with altogether too strong an incision of the wedge of Bolshevism into the institutions of the countries are commencing to realize that the only panacea for these moral maladies is in a firmer fixing of the principles of the Golden Rule and of religion in its purity in the character and the lives of the people.

Therefore when the secular press gives the weight of its influence in favor of those things which are after all the soul of real religion in our industrial economic and political life, they are grappling with a matter of the gravest importance to the world today, and in a manner and with an effectiveness that the pulpit does not, and to the secular clientele, cannot approach. What the world wants today is more of that practical honesty which gives to all a clean recognition of their rights, and to abandon that undercurrent or that comorancy of belief that all others of the brotherhood of man are created as food for their own existence, and that none else are entitled to live excepting their individual selves or the particular class or clan which they represent. In this press and those having the real interests of mankind at heart have before them an educative program which is being taken up in the proper spirit by our best newspapers, whose practical handling of these subjects cannot fail in making this campaign an effective one, the fruits of which are already in many instances most plainly evident.

Search for Missing Charlottetown Girl in St. John

ST. JOHN, Aug. 5.—Nine-year-old Sadie McAulay has been missing from her home in 30 Clarence street, since Tuesday afternoon. A diligent search was made yesterday afternoon in the vicinity of Douglas avenue, where the little girl was last seen, but without success. Her mother is nearly frantic over the loss of her little daughter and has not slept for two nights. The girl's father is at present in Charlottetown working and has not heard of the misfortune so far. Mrs. David McAulay said last evening that Sadie had left her home with Ethel Levine, who is eleven years of age, to take a lunch on Tuesday to the Levine girl's father, who is working in Douglas avenue. The two girls delivered the dinner and then wandered among the vacant lots in that vicinity picking berries. This child also mentions a man who offered to show them where better berries might be found, but said that she did not wait to see whether the little McAulay girl accepted the offer or not. "The mother said last night that this girl was not accustomed to wandering off alone. She is afflicted with a hip disease which causes her to walk lame. She was dressed in a blue coat, black hat, white shoes and stockings, wore a ring on her right hand and had her hair in "Dutch cut" style. The mother said that she had a dark complexion and was small for her age. She carried a small preserving jar at the time she was last seen by the little Levine girl. Sadie McAulay moved here from Charlottetown, (P. E. I.) with her parents and the rest of the family last May. Her father, owing to the scarcity of work, returned a short

time ago to his home town leaving his family here. Besides her parents she has one brother, Alexander, and four sisters, Lena, Eliza, Veronica and Emma. The latter is the only one of the family who is younger than the missing child. Sergeant-Detective Power and the rest of the detective department assisted by Sergeant Rankine and Policeman Totten and more than twenty men and boys searched the Douglas avenue section of the city yesterday afternoon but could not find no trace of the missing girl. No person could be discovered who had noticed a girl answering her description. The detectives and other members of the police force are working hard on the matter and hope to get some clue to the mystery today.
