### SAD DEATH IN SUMMERSIDE

#### William Hickey Killed by an Explosion

#### Of an Emery Wheel at Which he Was Working—The Top of His Head Completely Blown Off.

A sad fatal accident happened in John M. Clark & Co's mill Summerside yesterday shortly before noon by which Thomas Hickey was killed by a blow from a broken emery wheel. He was sharpening a cutter when in an instant he was hurled upwards a few feet back from the machine, and without uttering a word he breathed for about half an hour when death came. The emery wheel was about 1ft in diameter and broke through the centre, one half striking Mr. Hickey just below the forehead fracturing the skull. He was picked up by other employees in the mill and carried to one side where three physicians attended on him but nothing could be done to save his life.

The late Mr. Hickey had been employed in the mills under different owners for upwards of 25 years, and was a most capable workman. He was also engineer of steam fire engine Beaver which position he has held for several years. He was a member of St. Paul's Branch, C. M. B. A. and a popular citizen. Besides a grief stricken widow and two young children there are left to mourn an invalid mother, two brothers, James at present fireman on an engine at Hillsboro Bridge and Joseph at home, and two sisters, Mary Agnes at home and Maggie in the United States. Deceased was 47 years of age. Coroner Bowness held an inquest in the Council Chamber in the afternoon when the jury brought in a verdict of accidental death, attaching no blame to anyone.

Obituary.—Departed this life at Charlottetown, Lot 27, on Aug. 5th after a short illness by one with humble resignation to the divine will, Alexander K. Munson in the 80th year of his age. Deceased was born in Cullinshire, Scotland, in the year 1818. He emigrated to this Island in 1839 where he spent some time driving Her Majesty's mails from Charlottetown to Bedouque, and was for a number of years a trusty employe of Hor. Wm. G. Strong at Bedouque. In the year 1850 he was married to Ann Edwards who with six children survive him, two sons William and George having predeceased him. The survivors are John B. on the homestead, David at North Carleton, Charlotte wife of B. W. Cameron, carriage builder Summerside, Miss Kate of San Francisco, Maggie wife of Monson McNeill of North Carleton and Annie wife of Dr. Hanoldt of Southern California. The subject of this sketch was naturally of an hospitable, kind and cheerful disposition. He was a general favorite among young and old, and the poor way-faring man found in him a friend at all times; in fact his hospitality to travellers was almost in the extreme. He was a great reader, a pleasant conversationalist and ever delighted in talking of his native country. His last years were devoted entirely to the study of the bible. His funeral took place on the 7th inst., the officiating clergyman being Rev. Mr. McDougall, who visited him shortly before his death and found him perusing the Book of Life. His bereaved and aged partner and family in their sore affliction have the sympathy of the entire community. "Grieve not dear friends, it is not a parting for a ways and without consolation. Our sad farewells in this life are soon followed by joyous greetings in that better life, in that home not made with hands where God wipes away all tears from our eyes."—COM.

Miss Margaret McPherson is visiting her uncle John Ross, Kent Street. Miss McPherson was one of the nurses in South Africa during the recent war.


Percy W. Carver, Counselor at Law Boston, arrived in the city last night to assume a principal part in an interesting event which takes place here next week.
