Poultry Show Opens in City

The 34th annual poultry show sponsored by the P. E. I. Poultry Association Inc. got underway in the city last evening to the accompaniment of loud crowing and cackling from the 300 birds on display. All the yesterday exhibitors brought their entries to T. G. Ives Show Rooms, where the poultry exhibition is being held, and judging will get started this morning.

Beside a number of bantams, guinea hens and other freak varieties were on display last night. A hen, which was one of last spring's chicks, with a flock of her chickens, attracted considerable attention. Geese, rabbits and hares are also on exhibit.

His Honour, Lieutenant Governor B. W. LePage declared the show officially opened last evening. In a few remarks, he noted the improved stock which had been built up as a result of the enterprise of the department of the Association. He recalled the experience of crate feeding conducted by the Dominion Government thirty five years ago. He had pioneered in that demonstration of proper feeding and crate fattening of chickens on the market which proved to be a great success.

His Worship, Mayor B. Roy Holman wished the show every success and remarked on the "wonderful display" of poultry. He spoke of the educational value of such an exhibition and regretted that more citizens and farmers were not present to see it. The fact that nine purposes had been imported by a packing house to the province this year, shows that there is room for further expansion of this most important industry.

Mr. H. Dennis, minister of agriculture, speaking of the efforts of the department to assist the poultry industry, said that it was difficult to get the good-will and disapproval of the established chick clubs had been established in the province. About 30,000 chicks were distributed. Half the cost of brooder stoves was also paid by the department and as a result 256 stoves were placed in the hands of the people. He also told of efforts to have the non-producers culled from the flocks but this policy was abandoned when it was found that diseased chickens were increasing. It was believed that the men who went about culling the flocks were carrying the disease from place to place.

Mr. A. F. Darnell and P. C. Driscoll, of the Dominion Department of Agriculture will be the judges of the show.

Mr. W. J. Cudmore, exhibitor of the poultry show for 32 years, again held several entries on display last night. Mr. Cudmore recalled last night that he still has a silver trophy which he won with some champion birds in 1909, the second year of the annual exhibition. Since that time he has won 22 trophies and hundreds of cards. His brother, Mr. George Cudmore, has also been exhibiting birds for a quarter of a century and is again this year with several very good specimens. Mr. Albert Carr, president of the Association, is another old-time exhibitor who has some entries in this year's show.

Rotarians hear Address by Mr. T. W. L. Prowse

"There is a really wide difference between the war of economy of the present, insofar as Canada itself is concerned. The first war found Canada based upon an agricultural economy. This war finds us based upon an industrial economy," Mr. T. W. L. Prowse said in his address on "A Merchant View of Business Today" at the Rotary luncheon yesterday.

"The war is becoming more clearly a war of production," he stated, "and each camp is pushing its argument to the limit." The great problem in both camps, therefore, is how speedily and effectively the production energy of each country can be utilized from the satisfaction of civilian requirements, to the actual production of war necessities," he pointed out.

"From what has taken place in Germany, Italy and Japan, it is clear, and in England, since, and in Canada in the past 18 months, and is now taking place in the United States, it is most evident that the powers who control and command these two vast and unopposed organizations, have fully committed their nations to the above-stated program. And from that has also occurred in all these countries, is a serious, equally clear that no private interest, however large, will be permitted to stand in the way," he declared.

"From my point of view," said the speaker, "this program is correct. For private interests, which are selling for and servicing civilian requirements may have to stand and face in the meantime, it is nothing compared to what we have to face and suffer if our failure to 'bite on the bullet' now were to lose us this war."

He went on to say that "comparatively speaking, the old Agricultural economy required relatively few men and relatively little money compared with the present. This new industrial war economy will be found to require, before we are finished, all our men and virtually all our money."

Speaking of the decrease in unemployment, Mr. Prowse asserted that "the ever rising expansion of Canadian industrial production which has taken place both in civilian and war manufacturing, has absorbed these people with increasing swiftness." He predicted that at the end of this year "Canada will have no surplus manpower available on the voluntary system."

Decreasing Manufacturing

He said that "at present it is estimated that approximately 20 per cent of Canada's entire population is directed to war purposes. It is held in many quarters that before victory is achieved, this percentage must be lifted to 40 per cent." After reviewing the methods employed in other countries to expand the war production, he declared that it seems inevitable that among other expedients, we must anticipate decreasing manufacturing for civilian requirements and decreasing service to civilian needs, in order that labour may be transferred to the all-important production of war goods."

Dealing with the factor of manpower, Mr. Prowse referred to the "staggering cost" of the present war and said "it is obvious that the people of Canada in the walk of life, will eventually be forced to sacrifice more and more."

"Government can be expected to beg and borrow and take an ever increasing slice of our entire national income in order that our Canadian part in this struggle may prove decisive...."

Even now it is generally considered that stronger measures will be taken to stop the public spending, in order that their money may be diverted to the Government for war purposes."

Continuing, the speaker stated, "The manufacturing of fewer civilian units during phase two will naturally have a tendency to increase the cost of production. These costs have been rising steadily any day for other reasons, and a study of the figures shows that wholesale and commodity prices have risen without interruption since June, 1940, in Canada; since August, 1940, in the United States. It will be reasonable to expect, therefore, that although we may be facing declining units in civilian merchandise turnover, we may well at the same time prepare ourselves for increasing dollar turnover, due entirely to higher price levels. From the basic standpoint of the desirability of curtailing excess spending, this rise in the cost of living will in itself assist, unless wages are allowed to rise with prices, it is to be hoped that the expert economists advising upon the government departments concerned, the necessity for arresting the commencement of any such spiral of inflation."

Ministerial Ass'n Protests Sunday Films, Concerts

Rev. I. J. Levy was elected president of the P. E. I. Ministerial Association at the annual meeting held yesterday morning in St. Paul's Church, Charlottetown.

Other officers elected were: Rev. T. H. Bussell Somers, M.A., S.T.M., 1st vice president; Capt. W. Mercer, 2nd vice president and Rev. J. A. Nicholson, York, secretary-treasurer.

After a short discussion on Sunday showings of films in theatres and the selling of programs for concerts held in the City on the Sabbath, the following resolution was unanimously adopted: "We disapprove of the showing of films in local theatres and the holding of secular concerts on the Sabbath Day and we call upon all the members of our different churches to give loyal adherence to the principles of the Christian Sabbath."

Other matters dealt with were the formulating of plans for the week of prayer to be held in January. Reports of the services in the different institutions in the city were also received.
