STREET CONSTRUCTION.—Good progress is being made at street work in Charlottetown. The work of laying the concrete base on Water Street commenced on the 10th inst., and up to Tuesday evening 5,064 yards of it were laid. On Monday the 17th the work of laying the asphalt surface was started and 5,021 yards were laid up to Tuesday evening, which completed the work from the railway to the Esplanade. Work on asphaltting is now in progress on Haviland St. where the concrete was laid last season.

MIGRATORY BIRD LAW.—Corporal A. Fraser, of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police has arrived in Charlottetown from Ottawa in connection with the enforcement of the Migratory Bird Act. He will visit the principal centres of the Province. Cpl. Fraser is associated in the work with Mr. Rowe, deputy migratory bird warden, of Coleman and Mr. Duvany, of Nova Scotia. He reports that the law is being generally respected throughout Canada. Corp. Fraser is a veteran of the late war, having served 3 1/2 years in France with the Port Garry Horse, a force which lost 50 p. c. of their members in action.
