GIGANTIC IMPROVEMENTS PLANNED. AN UNIQUE WESTERN SCHEME. Historic.

"The Public Service Monthly," of Regina, Sask., dated July 1st, ult., contains an article on the above subject, which sheds much light on the proposed scheme to improve the route of the mighty St. Lawrence River North. The object is to convert it into a straight and deeper stream and thus improve its commercial and national features. When completed it is destined to become an ideal tourist attraction. Our contemporary says: Clearing of the Montreal River to afford easy access to Northern Saskatchewan by an all-water route via Lac la Rouge and the Churchill River will be undertaken by the Federal Government. This will enable prospectors and other mining men to use outboard motors on the rapids which, under present conditions, is impossible; it will permit them to take in heavier loads of material than now are practicable, and it will eliminate much of the danger that lurks in the stone-draw channel. For tourists it will open one of the finest down-stream canoe trips in Canada. It also states that work would begin as soon as the flood conditions in the river abated, but no later news about it has yet reached the press. The Montreal River flows northward out of Montreal Lake, whose southern extremity forms a bay in the Prince Albert National Park. It connects Montreal Lake with Lake la Rouge and the Churchill River, and at present is a considerable obstacle to the northward movement of prospectors, sportsmen and tourists. Studded with loose rocks and broken by rapids, the river presents a barrier, which for the great part of its course is navigable only by expert Indian paddlers who know every twist and turn and menacing rock. Thirty miles of rapids mark its sixty-mile course from its exit from Montreal Lake to its debauch in Lac la Rouge, which are passable only by lightly-laden canoes expertly handled, and exceedingly dangerous to amateurs. Clearance of the river bed of stones and rocks will remove much of the danger that threatens the amateur paddler, and will leave only two portages in the sixty miles, one three and a half miles, the other of one and a half miles. Montreal Portage, the longest, cuts off fully eight miles of an arduous river course, and therefore is no handi-capped both there and at Mountain Portage, the shorter. Provincial at present exist which the Provincial Government probably maintain. It is also likely that transportation facilities will be provided. At the present time, it is a five-day trip by canoe from the lower end of Montreal Lake adjoining the National Park to the Hudson Bay area, through the northern area, through the Pas, Man., and through the a. C. are considerably longer. Clearing of the Montreal River will not reduce the time of the trip, except to the extent that it will permit the use of outboard motors or canoes, which are impracticable under present conditions. For tourists contemplating a canoe trip, a suitable paradise will be opened with completion of the work. Starting at Montreal Lake they will be able to proceed downstream to Lake la Rouge, the northern portage, which is studded with thousands of islands. Thence to the Churchill River, down which they will go with the stream to Frog Portage; they will pass points of great beauty and new interest. A Portage of a few hundred yards will take them to water level, and by way of Wood Lake, Sturgeon Weir River, Amisk, or Beaver Lake, they will reach Sturgeon Landing, giving them access to the Saskatchewan River. An electro cut accompanies the above sketch and shows all the proposed expenditures. East. It would add great interest to the project, especially along the Quebec portion where our mighty Saint Lawrence rolls down to the Sea, but there may yet be a connection formed by means of the lakes and dells of the intervening country. Thus we may see another link to bind us together under the star of Confederation. Be this as it may, the prosperous East and the overflying West can afford to extend best wishes to the new enterprise.

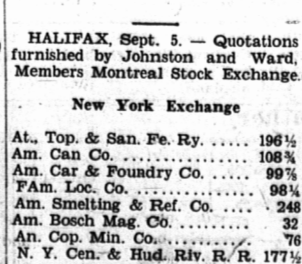

EGG LAYING CONTEST NOTES ON PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND EGG LAYING CONTEST FOR THE WEEK ENDING AUGUST 27, 1928.

The Model poultry Yards B. R. pen 20, led the Contest for the week with 49.3 points; Mr Charles McKenna's B. R. pen 14 were second with 43.3 points; The Model Poultry Yards B. R. pen 1 were third with 40.2 points and Mr. W. Pickering B. R. pen 16 were fourth with 35.3 points. The Kensington Baby Chick Hatchery B. R. pen 3, still leads the contest with 23.7 points; Mrs. J. F. Easton's W. L. hens numbers 1, 4 and 9 are second, third and fourth with 23.4, 23.1 and 22.8 points respectively. The pens leading in total production are: First, Mr. Everett Howatt's W. L. No. 2, 1807 eggs, 1883, points. Second, Experimental Farm W. L. 4, 1769 eggs 1798.8 points. Third, Model Poultry Yards, B. R. 7, 1813, eggs 1790.9 points. Fourth, Mr. Harold Lairds, B. R. 11, 1625, eggs 1739.2 points. The total number of eggs for the week was 558 and to date 29372.
