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Jacobs And Budge Top Seeded List

BY BILL BONI Associated Press Sports Writer NEW YORK, Sept. 1.—(AP)—Don Budge, Bobby Riggs and Joe Hunt, three of the four members of the United States Davis Cup squad who on Saturday will begin defence of the trophy against Australia today were placed at the top of the domestic seeded list for the men's United States Singles tennis championship which opens a week from today at Forest Hills.

The championship, in which Budge will seek to add his second United States crown to the Australian, French and Wimbledon titles he has won this year, drew an entry of 99 players, including 27-year-old Albert Marble and eight foreigners, were seeded, with Australia's two-fisted John Bromwich heading the invading contingent.

Wholly Budge could have topped the men's list there was a slight surprise in the placing of Helen Hull Jacobs in the No. 1 women's seeded list. The seeding committee evidently based this rating on the Berkeley, Calif., Miss Marble, No. 1 in the United States, was given second place in the seedings.

Two Montreal players will carry Canada's slim hopes in the men's singles. Roger Durivage, French and Wimbledon school teacher, and Francis Poncec of Yugoslavia, third-seeded foreigner, in the first round, said Budge will have an easier match, meeting the great, an unseeded player from Cincinnati.

Adrian Quist, Bromwich's Davon Cup mate, follows in the list of favored foreigners, which also includes, in order Poncec, Destremeur and Yvon Petra of France, Franjo Kukulevic of Yugoslavia, Fumitser Nakano of Japan and Charles Edgar Hare of England.

Pirates Increase League Lead Blanking Giants 6-0; Tigers Take Yankees 6-3

NEW YORK, Sept. 1.—(AP)—The pennant march of the Pirates rolled over New York Giants 6-0 today and advanced to seven full games in front of the National League parade.

Blanked with seven hits by Rookie Bob Klinger, the Giants dropped below second place for the first time this year, winding up fourth half a game behind Cincinnati Reds and Chicago Cubs, who climbed into a tie for the runner-up berth.

A ladies day crowd of 28,339 saw Klinger come off the hospital list and demonstrate that his sore arm is once more ready for active duty. With no backing at the plate, Pete Hal Schumacher's ailing pitching wing was no match for the blazing buns. He was tagged for 11 of the Pirates' 12 hits and finally a three-run barrage in the seventh.

At Chicago, the Cubs capitalized on Johnny Lanning's wildness, beating Boston's home homer signaling a return to hitting form. Boston Red Sox took the odd game of the three-game series from St. Louis Browns today 5-3. Fritz Ostermueller pitched fine ball, allowing the Browns only seven hits.

At St. Louis, the Cardinals made it four out of five over Philadelphia Phillies by taking the series finale in three runs in the second inning. After yielding a run in the third, Bill Shoffner, who relieved Lanning, blanked the Cubs the rest of the way.

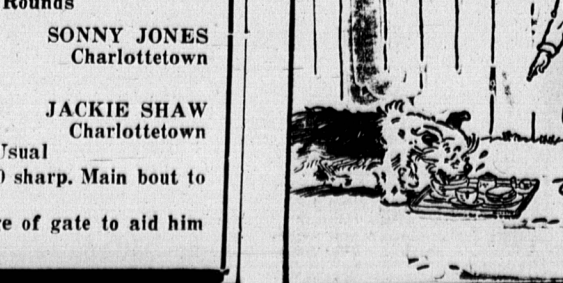
