ISLANDER DEAD—Mr. Edward D. Berrigan, one of Boston's oldest contractors and builders, died at his Dorchester, Mass. home last week, aged 73 years. He was a native of P. E. Island and went to Boston when twenty years of age and soon established himself in the contracting business there, later moving to Dorchester, where he had resided for the last twenty years. In his younger years he erected many buildings in Boston and was always active in his business, which still is located there. He is survived by two daughters and three sons.

TO DEVELOP BOSTON MARKET—An important conference between the Council of the Charlottetown Board of Trade and certain Boston commercial interests comprising Mr. B. Atwood Robinson, importer and exporter, Mr. A. G. Williams, wholesale grocer and producer merchant, and Mr. L. Fielding steamship agent, was held last evening in the Board of Trade rooms to consider a proposal by the latter to form a collective and distributing produce agency featuring Island produce on the Boston market. After a full and free interchange of views, it seemed to be the consensus of opinion that the American market would afford a much better price for Island products if properly graded and attractively packaged and shipped collectively under one head and under one brand than as at present. The collective idea of marketing is becoming general and meeting with success in various world markets. A committee was appointed by the chairman Mr. W. M. Rowe to bring the matter before the annual meeting of the Associated Boards of Trade for further action.

The Markets

OTTAWA, Ont., July 19.—An easy feeling continues to prevail on practically all egg markets today.

Toronto—Country shippers report receipts light. They are paying producers extras 25 to 27, firsts 23 to 24, seconds 20. Toronto dealers are quoting for ungraded eggs, delivered, extras 30 to 31, firsts 25 to 27, seconds 20 to 22. Prices to retailers extras 35 to 36, firsts 31, seconds 27 to 28. Sales are being made in a jobbing way at extras 33 to 34, firsts 29 to 30, seconds 26.

Montreal—There is an easier feeling on the market. Extras are in fair demand, but other grades are dull. Dealers are quoting delivered for ungraded eggs extras 31 to 33, firsts 26 to 30, seconds 21 to 25. Prices to retailers extras 34, firsts 30 to 32, seconds 23 to 29. Fresh broilers are wholesaling at 48 to 50, and ducks at 38 to 40.

Winnipeg—Egg market is steady with receipts showing a decline. Quality poor. Dealers are quoting shippers extras 25, firsts 23, seconds 18, delivered cases returned. Prices to retailers extras 35, firsts 30 to 32, seconds 26. A car is rolling from Dauphin costing extras 2-1-2, firsts 2-1-2, seconds 23, delivered.

Winnipeg, Saskatchewan—Receipts continue to decline. Country dealers are selling extras 22, firsts 20, seconds 16. Prices to retailers extras 35 to 37, firsts 33 to 35, seconds 31 to 33.

St. John—Egg market is steady with fair demand. Country dealers paying producers extras 21, firsts 27, seconds 25, and selling extras 32, firsts 28, seconds 22. Prices to retailers extras 36, firsts 32, seconds 28.

Halifax—The egg market is weak with receipts arriving freely. Dealers paying country shippers delivered Halifax, extras 33, firsts 28, seconds 20.

Charlottetown—Receipts are lighter and the market is dull and lower. Wholesalers are paying country points extras 27, firsts 23, seconds 17. Jobbing extras 32, firsts 29, seconds 24.

MONTREAL, July 19.—Dominion Livestock Report. Cattle receipts 939. Interest centered chiefly in small stock and cattle sales were slow in starting. With the exception of an odd bull or fat cow there were no finished cattle on sale. Steers of fairly good quality weighing 1,100 pounds or better were sold for 7.25 with a few of the best up to 7.50, and very light common steers were weighed up with light heifers at 5.00. Several loads of near fat ground weight cows were weighed up around 5.00 and fair heifers weighing from 500 to 900 or better brought about 6.00. Common bulls were lower and slow sellers. An odd choice bull was being held for 6.00. Calf receipts 2,900. Good veals sold from 8.00 to 18.50 with one or two small lots at 3.00 and an odd choice veal at 10.00 and 10.50 medium to fair lots sold around 7.50 and grassers mostly 4.75 to 5.00. Sheep receipts 2,288. Lambs were lower. Good lots sold for 15 cents with one lot of over eighty at 15.4 cents. Common lambs brought 14 cents and mixed lots sold around 11.50 and 12.00. Hogs receipts 2,032. Hogs were lower. Straight lots of good quality sold for 15.50 and lots containing a large percentage of lights brought 15.25. Sows mostly 11.00.
