Many parcels are being sent merely by way of experiment and for comparison with the service of the express companies. Some days the arrival of two wagon loads of heavy paving bricks, which a brick-maker named Parry desired to send out as samples. There were 1000 bricks made up into separate parcels, each weighing 6lb, and it took the small post office staff, assisted by willing volunteers, over six hours to deal with the consignment.
