THE GOVERNMENT AND THE LICENSE LAW.

We referred some time ago to the failure of justice in the matter of the charge against the proprietor of the Davies Hotel. The parties most concerned, both on the part of the prosecution and the defence would no doubt be glad to have the matter passed over without further notice or comment. We regard the matter as too serious to be thus disposed of. There is nothing pertaining to our public affairs that should be more strictly guarded than the administration of justice. It is vital to the life of the state that the innocent shall be protected against injustice and that those guilty of violating the law of the land shall be punished.

In this case the public Prosecutor preferred a grave charge against a prominent hotel-keeper and furnished to the Court the names of a number of credible witnesses to substantiate the charge. The charge, if proven, would have involved forfeiture of the liquor selling license of the offender. What the public want to know is why that charge was never brought to trial? Why did not the Prosecutor appear with his witnesses at the time and place appointed for trial and make good his charge by sworn testimony, if he could? We are not told why, but we all know what occurred. The bar-tender confessed, his fine was paid and the case against the proprietor was dropped. He retains his license and is still selling under its protection.

The Magistrate stood ready, as we believe, to hear and determine the matter without fear, favor or affection. The failure was not in the Court. The failure primarily was with the Prosecutor, who is after all but the instrument of the Provincial Government. The Prosecutor retains his office and the Government accepts the responsibility. This method of protecting the license of a liquor seller, and of administering the law is good enough for the Provincial Ministers. It is a legitimate inference that the same method of escape is open and will be kept open to other licensees should similar charges be preferred against them. Let the bartender confess, hand in somebody's cheque for the amount of the fine and let the business go on at the old stand!

There is something more than a failure of justice involved in such a transaction. There is such a perversion of justice that must shake the confidence of the community in the administration of the liquor law. And what confidence can the community have in the honest administration of the prohibitory law a year hence in face of such a transaction as that under review? Carry into the enforcement of the prohibitory law the same Prosecutor and the same methods and will not the prohibitory law

become a farce? Nothing can restore the shaken confidence of the public unless it be an honest administration of the liquor law we now have. At present the licensees of the Government do practically as they please.

eased from the siege he was undergoing at Rustenburg. The resourceful Dewet has escaped from the cord'n with which Lord Kitchener had surrounded him and has crossed the Vaal River to the northward. At last accounts Dewet had about 1,500 men and five guns.

Very little has been heard of General Buller of late, and Strathcona's Horse are with him. It is hinted that the latter may have gone north with Lord Dundonald's cavalry to operate with General French against the Boer forces on the line of the Delagoa Bay Railway. The Canadian Mounted Infantry when last heard from were distributed along the main railway to protect that line between Kroonstadt and Johannesburg. The First Canadian Regiment having joined Lord Kitchener south of the Vaal River are operating against Dewet. The Cape Rifles under Brabant are on the same quest. It had been thought that the First Canadians might escape further fighting, but this expectation will not be realized. They are after Dewet.

After a walk to Victoria Park many persons, and especially those of advancing years or weakly frames will naturally desire to sit and rest for a time. But in the fine evenings, or when some special attraction calls large numbers thither the few seats are altogether insufficient to accommodate those who need them. The same is true with regard to the Queen Square gardens. There the grounds and walks are much frequented on all fine nights and especially when a band is playing. The great majority on such occasions are compelled to stand, or walk around. There is a real need for more seats both in the Park and Gardens. If our City Fathers will see that the wait is supplied they will by so much earn the gratitude of both citizens and visitors.

Harrismith, recently taken possession of by Gen. Hector Macdonald, has a population of 2,000, of whom, 1,200 are Europeans, mostly of British descent. It is a favorite health resort and summer residence for the people of Natal, and there are many pretty residences. There are Dutch, English, Methodist and Presbyterian churches, and a number of creditable public buildings. The highest peaks of the Drakensburg range are in its vicinity, thus giving an outlook upon scenic grandeur. Harrismith is said to be the third town in importance in the Orange River Colony.

The Examiner puts up the pitiful plea that this "is a small city doing a small telegraph business" and consequently does not need a night service. That any sort of service is good enough for Charlotte-town and Prince Edward Island is apparently the Examiner's notion. That is a very narrow, contracted, small-souled view of the case, in our judgement.
