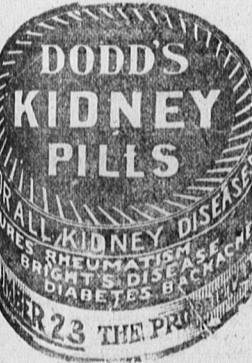

**ISLAND INDIAN WOUNDED**—A telegram received by Madeline Francis, Lennox Island, informs her that her brother, Barnaby Francis, was wounded on January 16th. Barnaby enlisted in the 55th New Brunswick Battalion, and was drafted into the 26th. He was on the firing line before Thaddeus Knockwood and met with no mishap till now. There are no particulars.

**CONGRATULATIONS**—In the Sussex County Times, published in Hantsport, England, appears in the issue of Jan. 13th, notice of the birth at Hantsport, of a daughter to Lieut. James J. Leighton, of the 98th Canadian Siege Battery, C. E. F. France. Lieut. and Mrs. Leighton's numerous friends in Charlottetown will be interested to learn of the arrival of their little daughter, which event was chronicled in the Guardian some time since.

**NEW DETENTION HOME**—At a meeting of the Ottawa City Council last week, Sir Louis Davies and Hon. Sidney Fisher headed a deputation which asked \$25,000 for a new building to replace the present detention home which is not fire-proof and not large enough. The board decided to ask special legislation to raise the amount by debenture, says the Ottawa Citizen.

### STEAMER IS WRECKED OFF SAMBRO ISLAND

(Canadian Press Despatch.)  
HALIFAX, Feb. 7.—The Marine and Fisheries Department today received the following message:  
"The British steamer Retlaw struck rocks five miles south of Sambro Island, No. 2 held full of water. Wants assistance immediately."  
The naval authorities sent out four steamers to the assistance of the vessel. G. S. Campbell and Brister Sons sent their tugs and the Marine Department sent the C. G. S. Lady Laurier to the scene.

The last word from the ship was that the crew were taken to the boats. Several of the steamers returned late tonight and reported that they could find no trace of the ship or crew.
