A PARENT'S ANXIETY

Sir.—"A Reader" is out again to question my statements. The difference between us is not in the exactitude of figures, but whether the boys who enlisted early in the war should be given a chance to come home or not, and still keep up our four divisions on the firing line to full strength as well. However, I may say that the official statement made by Sir Edward Kemp as reported in the Daily Star of the 10th inst, fully bears out my calculation. He gave total enlistments 424,456, and number never proceeding overseas 65,900, that is; the shrinkage in the enlistments lists is almost one in six. He gave the number of recruits in July 4,257; the casualties 3,637; discharges 1,676; making a total wastage of 5,313. It is also added "that only a small proportion of the recruits in July were infantry so that the wastage was at least three times greater than the number of recruits secured for the needed service." Now take into account the shrinkage on enlistments and you will see that my figures were substantially correct.

"A Reader" refers to my inaccuracy, unreliability, etc., based all on that statement of the net losses which you will see is quite fair. But are "A Reader's" statements to be taken as reliable. Referring to some of the wounded and tired being allowed to come home he says: "and in even in this political favoritism is said to be shown." A subtle way of publishing a serious charge without giving proof. I challenge "A Reader" to cite a single case of such favoritism. Another statement in "A Reader's" first letter. He says referring to recruiting in July: "that during this period the Government was doing every thing in its power to discourage voluntary recruiting." Does any man out side a lunatic asylum believe that 4,257 would enlist in one month and the Government doing everything in its power to discourage recruiting. To return to the question at issue my contention is that Canada, like Australia should provide men to relieve the first bodies who went to the front, besides make good the losses. "A Reader" meets this contention with the sneer "this of course would be very nice," and adds the German argument in justification of any brutality, "it would not be war."

"A Reader" represents the argument against conscription and getting the men. I represent thousands of parents who met Canada's call for men and permitted their boys to go but we think Canada should do her part, and send more men and give the first to go, some chance even to come home alive. Voluntary recruiting will not do that and "A Reader" knows it will not. It is hard enough to bear perpetual anxiety, but when all efforts of providing relief is paralysed by party strife the outlook is blue indeed. I am, Sir, etc. ANXIOUS FATHER.

NOT THE ARCHBISHOP'S VIEWS.

MONTREAL.—In view of the fact that certain French newspapers, such as La Croix and L'Idéal Catholique, have been publishing articles advocating the separation of Quebec from the rest of the Confederation, and that these papers have generally been considered semi-official organs of the church, Archbishop Bruchési was asked to state his views on the question. His Grace replied that he thought such articles were thoughtless and unreasonable.

"Such papers," he said, "are not in any sense official organs. While they are Catholic papers, their views are merely the views of the proprietors. I have never had and have not any newspaper organ, except the Semaine Religieuse, which deals with religious questions. It has nothing whatever to do with politics. The anti-Confederation views expressed cannot in any sense be taken as representing my views."
