Timely Advice Against Epidemic

Official Statement Re Infantile Paralysis Issued From Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Sept. 10.—A statement issued today by the Department of National Health, gives the total number of infantile paralysis reported in Canada for the month ending August 31, 1929. In addition, there are seven suspected cases. The provincial figures are as follows: Nova Scotia two; New Brunswick, one; Prince Edward Island, none; Quebec, 23; Ontario (five weeks), 96; Manitoba, 15; Saskatchewan, 15; Alberta, three; British Columbia, nine.

The statement adds: "In answer to enquiries, the Deputy Minister of National Health has advised parents that if their children are away in the country, they might remain there for two or three weeks longer. In 1928 the number of cases, the children will be as safe in the week beginning September 2nd.

Briand Scheme Regarded With Suspicion

LONDON, Sept. 10.—The idea of Rt. Hon. W. Graham, President of the British Board of Trade, which was presented to the assembly of the League of Nations yesterday at Geneva advocating an agreement among nations not to increase tariffs for a period of two years, has been warmly received in London as a practicable advance towards diminishing tariff barriers. On the other hand, Premier Aristide Briand's conception of an economic united states of Europe is regarded with considerable suspicion.

Senate Committee To Investigate

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—The Senate naval committee today voted for an investigation of activities by United States shipbuilding corporations in connection with international naval limitations conferences. The committee's decision must be approved by the Senate. A resolution to authorize the inquiry is expected to be offered by Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho, who first called upon the committee to inquire into statements by William B. Shearer, big navy advocate, that he was employed by shipbuilding corporations to represent them at the unsuccessful 1927 Geneva conference.

Chinese Enter And Destroy British Property

LONDON, Sept. 10.—An incident of international moment, which is likely to be quickly followed by considerable reaction here was reported tonight by the Daily Mail's Hankow correspondent. He declares that Chinese municipal authorities today entered property belonging to the Butterfield Esquire, British shipping firm, and demolished buildings. Wuhang municipality, comprising Hankow, Wuchang and Hanyang, according to the correspondent, demanded that the company hand over waterfront premises for the erection of a new building. The company refused and the municipality declined to negotiate through the usual diplomatic channels.

Big Reduction In U. S. Potatoes

Island Potato Growers Advised To "Sit Tight" For Good Prospective Market.

Today's estimate 349,000,000 bushels. Sit tight for high prices. The above estimate, it will be noted, is a reduction of practically 24,000,000 bushels since the Aug. 10th estimate.
