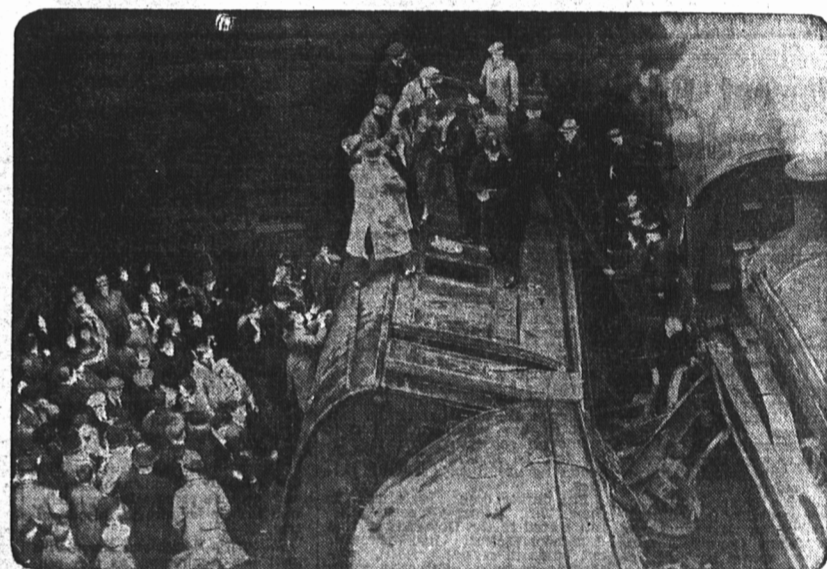

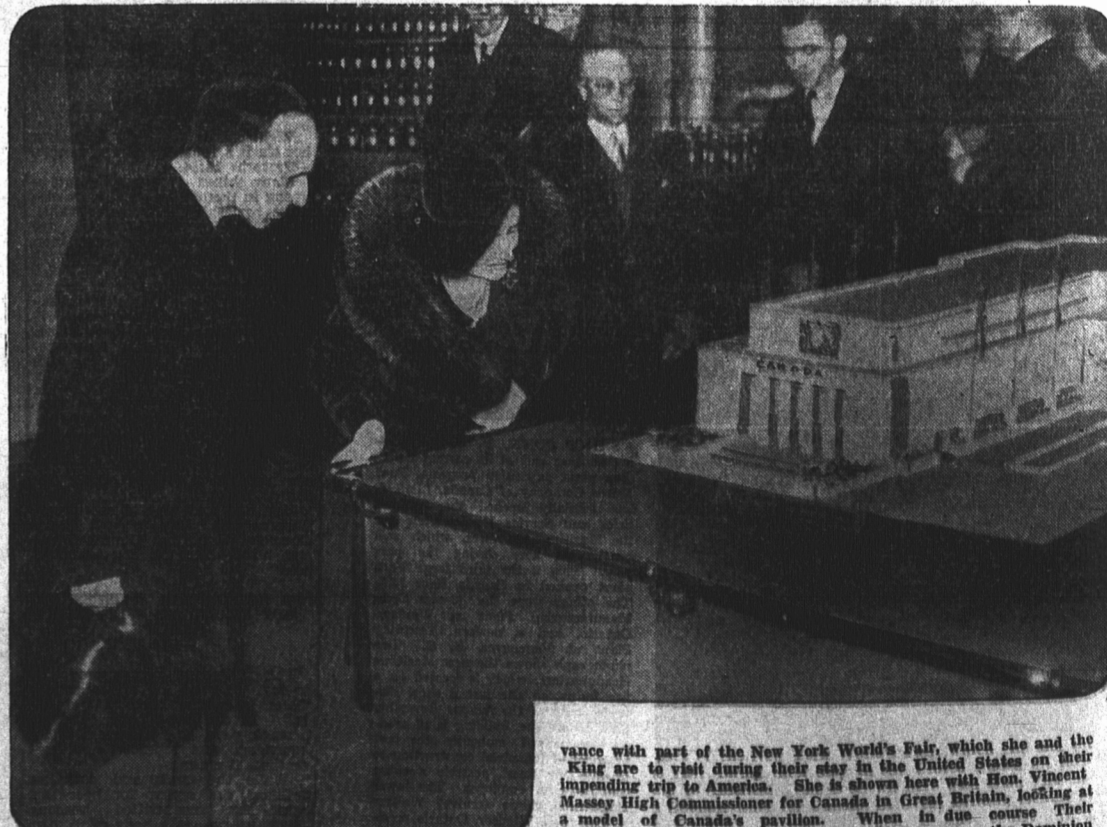
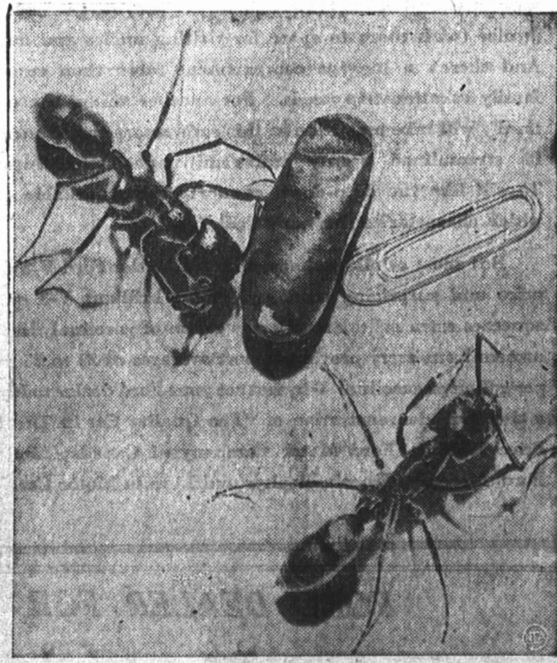
Lord Gort, chief of the Imperial General Staff, who is modernizing the British Army.



One man was killed and 31 persons hurt when one train ploughed into the side of another at the entrance to a tunnel near Stobeross street station, Glasgow a few days ago. One of the trains was a special carrying football fans to a Scottish Cup game at Parkhead. Rescue workers are shown here helping girls through the windows of one of the overturned coaches, whose position compelled rescuers to use ladders, one of which can be seen at the right.



Deep in the jungles of the Mount Rara region of British Guiana, Dr. Paul Zahl of Union College, Schenectady, N. Y. discovered a "new world." Dr. Zahl suggests the community, inhabited by Indians living in Utopian harmony, as possible haven for European refugees. Above are two contrasting views of the "new world." Ten times as high as Niagara, waterfall on the Urtahl river, left, falls 1000 feet. But giant, species Dinoponera Grandis, also roam the area and natives believe four successive stings from these insects cause death. Photo at right shows first living specimens of these ants ever brought to America, compared to a paper clip. Cylindrical cocoon of ants also is shown.



On a visit to the British Industries Fair in London a few days ago, Her Majesty took the opportunity to familiarize herself in advance with part of the New York World's Fair, which she and the King are to visit during their stay in the United States on their impending trip to America.
