AN OPEN DOOR

"Shortly after midnight a decently dressed young man glanced furtively round Trafalgar Square, hesitated a moment, and then ran swiftly up the steps of St. Martin's Church. I came up behind him as he tapped the door.

"There was the sound of a drawn bolt, and the door swung back. The young man stammered. He was blue with cold, and—there was something else: 'I'm—I'm broke,' he said. 'I've never done this before. I've always had a bit of money; but—well, I've nowhere to sleep tonight, and—please can I come in?'"

"The door opened wider, and a pleasant middle-aged policeman said: 'Come along!' I followed.

"Down in the crypt of St. Martin's Church, the church whose doors never close, I saw a remarkable sight. Broad, white arches spanned a dim gloom. Certain benches were set facing the east, as in the church above, and others were placed round the crypt. Lying, sitting upright, and huddled in every position of which the human body is capable, were men and women, homeless wanderers over the hard face of the earth.

"There was no sound in the white crypt but variously keyed snores and the small scratch of a policeman's pen as he kept a record of Christ's guests, for such they are; and as I looked at them these words sang in my heart: 'Come unto Me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest.'

"Sanctuary. That was it. They had the hunted air of having run hard to find this place, and having found it, had abandoned themselves to safety. There was something else. They reminded me of a picture that used to thrill me when I was a child: troops rolled in their cloaks beside dead fires, sleeping before a battle. Their battle was tomorrow.

"There was a young girl who could not sleep. . . . There was a grey-haired woman sleeping upright in a pew, a poor, rakish hat, on a pile of prayer books, beside her. Three or four other women slept near together, leaning against each other. . . .

"Most of the men slept. Some had no overcoats. Others had placed their coats over their heads. . . . One elderly man, awakened suddenly, shot out an arm to look at his wrist-watch. But no watch was there and he drew his hand under his coat again as though it hurt.

"Some extraordinary dramas have been acted on the steps outside in the small hours, said a young man officially connected with the church. 'Once a girl was saved from white-slavery. Once I brought in a boy so blue with cold that I had to open the furnace doors to thaw him out. Most of the down-and-outs know this church. . . . But we never lose faith in human nature. . . .

"Are you often deceived by people who drift in here during the night? . . .

"Now and then. It's nothing com-

pared with the friends we make, the delightful characters we discover when the ache and pain of hardship have worn off. . . . 'We don't care what they are,' said the young man. 'If they are in trouble, that is enough.'

"I hardly heard him for I was thinking that in this white place is the Spirit of Christ."

Bearcats Won Maritime Title

Defeated Bathurst In Halifax Lost Night 3 To 2, Winning The Series 4 To 2.

HALIFAX, N. S., Mar. 10.—The Truro Bearcats won the amateur hockey championship of the Maritime Provinces here tonight by defeating Bathurst, N. B., three to two in the second and final game for the title. The Bearcats had a one goal lead as a result of their 1-0 victory at Bathurst Friday, thus the total score for the two games was 4-2. On Wednesday, the Truro team will leave for Montreal to play the Quebec champions Friday and Monday in the Allan Cup play-downs. It was the fifth time for the Bearcats to win the Maritime championship in seven years.

The match, one of the best exhibitions of the National game played in Halifax this season, was watched by the largest crowd of the year, over six thousand people thronging the Forum.

Bathurst, 1929 Maritime titleholders, wiped out the one goal deficit sustained in the first game of the series at Bathurst Friday in the opening session and went one goal in front early in the second period, but their rally was shortlived and the Bearcats came back to score a pair of markers before the middle canto and shot the winning marker in the last five minutes of play. Sammy Murdoch, who has played in five Maritime championship teams in the last seven years, was the outstanding player in tonight's game, at times holding the entire Bathurst team at centre ice with his clever poke checking. Murdoch assisted in one goal.

Goals came cheap tonight. Of the five scored during the sixty minutes, two were from nice plays, while the remaining three were lucky tallies. The first Bathurst score, coming after five minutes of play in the opening period, was off Kenny Carroll's stick and was a roller from the wing that caromed off Skeet Kuhn's skate into the meshes. After three minutes of the second period Kuhn stopped Gammon's shot and then put the rubber into the cage himself in attempting to stop a score. A minute later Murdoch engineered a smart play and passed to Doggie Kuhn for a nice score. Exactly four minutes later Glennie's long roller from the

wing eluded goalie Bond and tied the score for the game and put the Bearcats one up on the series.

After fifteen minutes of fast play in the final twenty minutes of the match, Hymie McArthur, midget left-winger of the new champions, went through the entire Bathurst team, drew goalie Bond out and slipped the rubber into the meshes on the best individual play of the night.

The spectators, most of whom favored Truro, went wild with joy when McArthur scored, Bathurst had an edge in the first period and out-shot the Bearcats by seven to four, although their margin was greater than the stops by the rival goalies indicate. In the second stanza goalie Bond, Bathurst, stopped thirteen shots to seven for Kuhn, while in the closing period Kuhn had six shots, less than Bond.

There was much hard bumping throughout the game, but very little dirty play and only a few penalties were handed out, although they came in bunches and on two occasions there were only nine men on the ice.

BABE SIGNS FOR \$80,000

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. March 10.—Babe Ruth, hon erun king of baseball this afternoon affixed his signature to a two year contract calling for a yearly salary of \$80,000. The signing took place at the hotel suite of Col. Jacob Ruppert, owner of the New York Yankees, after Ruth had been kept waiting by Ruppert for more than an hour in the hotel lobby.

Much speculation had been going on in baseball circles over the attitude taken by Ruth this spring. At one time he announced he was through and would continue his feature side issues should the Yankee management fail to accept his proposed figure of \$85,000.

Each had to give away to a \$5,000 concession, the Suit of Swat dropping to that extent and the Ruppert interests going that much higher than they had offered.

While many figured the Babe would not forsake his favorite past-time, still his threats stirred followers of the game. He has kept in condition meanwhile.
