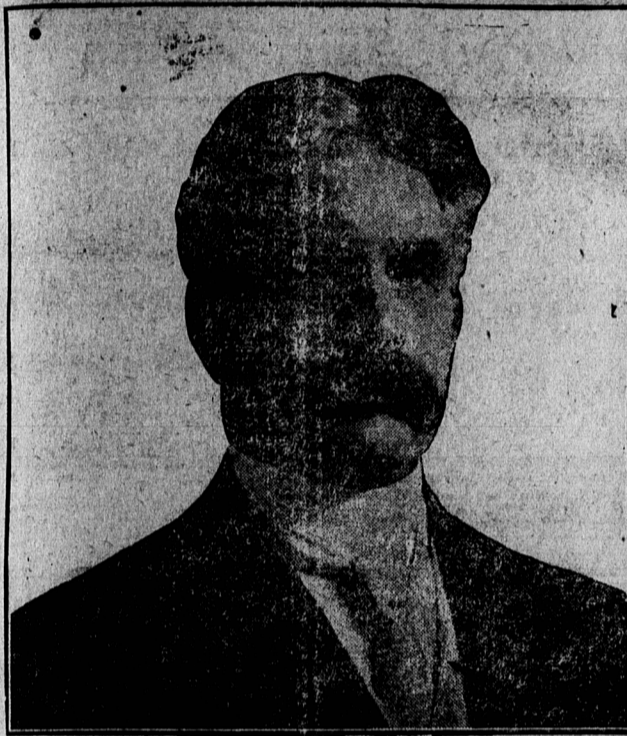

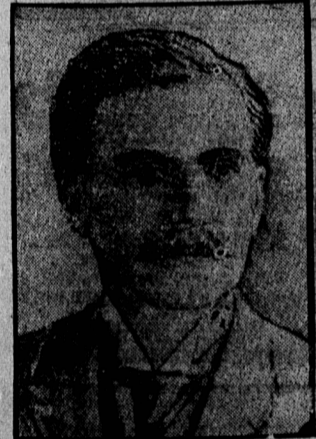

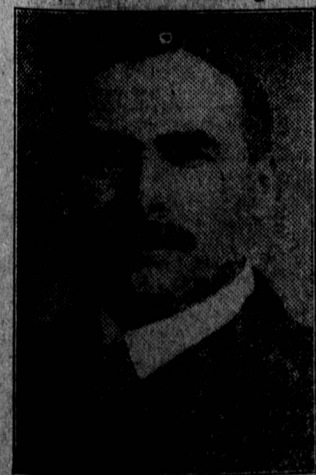
HON. R. L. BORDEN, Premier and President of the Council—Canada's first Minister without portfolio.

MERTS IDEAL, WEDS IN TEN MINUTES

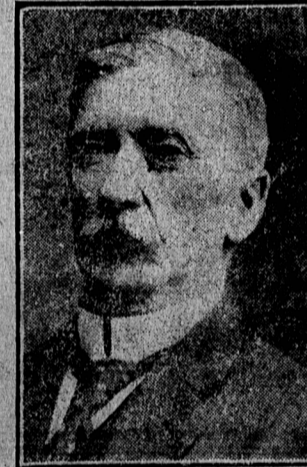

HALIFAX, November, 29—With her rudder out of commission, the steamer Berwindmoor of the Havana Coal Company, is drifting helplessly at the mercy of the seas within the sight of Halifax. On Nov. 12 the Berwindmoor sailed from Narvik, Norway, with a cargo of ore bound for Philadelphia. Several days ago word was received that the big tank steamer was in distress in the vicinity of Sable Island and on Monday afternoon word reached here that she had been picked up by a German tank steamer and was probably being towed to Halifax.
