PILOT'S HAND MANGLED—A story of courage following an accident on one of the Fairchild seaplanes in the service of the royal Canadian Mounted Police, attached to the Shediac base, was related today, says the Saint John Telegraph Journal of the 22nd. While the seaplane was on its return to Shediac from an inspection of the waters of the Gulf of St. Lawrence off the Cape Breton coast yesterday afternoon, Flight Lieutenant Lyall Harding, Ottawa, pilot, met with a severe and painful mishap. When north of Prince Edward Island, Lieutenant Harding thrust his left hand out of the port side window to give a signal. The hand came in contact with a small propeller used to operate the generator supplying power to the radio. The accident occurred high in the air at a point about 60 miles from Shediac Bay. Although suffering severely from the injury and bleeding profusely, Lieutenant Harding did not lose control. The propeller cut off the thumb, the end of the forefinger and lacerated the end of the middle finger. R. C. M. P. Constable Grant, who accompanied the pilot affixed a tight bandage to the left arm and bound up the hand. Lieutenant Harding continuing at his post for the 60 miles. The plane was headed directly for Shediac, alighting on the bay 35 minutes later. The injured airman was taken by car to the office of Dr. D. R. MacDonald, who, after dressing the hand, ordered Lieutenant Harding to the Moncton City Hospital, where he is reported to be resting comfortably.

New Jersey Stock Market Will Open October 2nd

NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—(AP)—The New York Stock Exchange will lose about 25 of its most active stocks on Oct. 2, when trading will definitely be started in New Jersey, it was asserted in well-informed brokerage quarters in Wall Street today.

Leading brokers said with conviction that trading on the newly organized New Jersey Stock Exchange would start on that date, regardless of whether or not Mayor O'Brien had signed the New York City taxes on brokers and stock transfers by that time.

While trading will begin with only about 25 stocks, it was explained that the New Jersey list would be expanded as rapidly as mechanical facilities would permit. Also, it was said that as soon as stocks were removed to New Jersey, trading in those shares would cease in the New York Exchange.

Prem. Brownlee Flatly Denies Serious Charge

EDMONTON, Sept. 22.—An order was made by Mr. Justice J. R. Boyle today giving permission to the plaintiffs in an action brought by Vivian Macmillan and her father Allan D. Macmillan, against Premier J. E. Brownlee, for seduction of the first-named, to serve a statement of claim on the defendant, at Ottawa. The order provided that the defence or demand of notice be filed within 25 days after service.

OTTAWA, Sept. 22.—Emphatic denial of allegations contained in a statement of claim served on him, was made by Premier J. E. Brownlee, of Alberta, here today.

"I have received by long distance telephone the contents of the statement of claim," said Mr. Brownlee. "I emphatically deny the allegations and will defend the action to the limit and hope to show before I am through, the real cause behind it."

Premier Brownlee said that he had nothing further to add at present. He is a member of the Royal Commission on Banking which is engaged in preparing a report for the Government, after touring Canada.

U.S. FARMERS DEMAND PRODUCTION COSTS

Will Go On Strike If The President Does Not Grant Requests.

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Agriculture Code

The code for agriculture adopted by the meeting called for a guarantee of cost of production prices on agricultural products, a maximum work day of 10 hours except in cases of emergency and the setting of wages by the American Federation of Labor.

The demands to be made upon the President and the recovery administration, non-compliance with which would be accepted as grounds for calling the strike were:

Cost of production in conformity with the agricultural code; a definite and specific pledge that Congress will enact the Frazier Bill at the next regular session; immediate payment of the soldier's bonus by a currency issue; immediate use of the inflation power of the President.
