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CALIGULA'S GALLEY IS SLOWLY RISING FROM LAKE NEMI

ROME, May 7.—The receding waters of Lake Nemi have left some two feet of Caligula's famous ship projecting above the surface. A considerable expanse of the deck and hull of the ancient galley can be seen rising obliquely out of the clear waters of the lake. Though the authorities, fearing some harm may be done, have taken provisions to prevent any one from approaching the ship too closely, many hundreds of sightseers journey from Rome to Nemi every day to view the marvel of a ship which witnessed the revels of Rome's mad Emperor rising out of the water after having been immersed nineteen centuries.

The method of the construction of the ship can now be clearly seen. Several stout beams forming the skeleton of the vessel project above the surface of the water. To them, by means of long copper nails which have lost none of their original brilliance, are attached thick planks, constituting the deck and hull. The hull was then covered with leaden

BAKED APPLE WITH ORANGE IS GOOD RECIPE

6 baking apples, seedless raisins, 1-4 cup orange juice, 2 table spoons sugar, orange slices, sugar or honey, water, quick cooking tapioca.

Core apples, leaving cavity at stem end. Stuff cavities with raisins. Add sugar to orange juice and fill any remaining space in cavities with this. Cover cavities each with orange slice dipped in sugar, or honey. Add enough water to remaining mixture to fill pan half way. Add two tablepoons quick cooking tapioca to each cup water used, putting bits of orange slices also between apples in pan. Bake until apples are tender. The orange makes a very

pretty garnish for the apples and adds a delightful flavor.

Lemon slices and lemon juice may be used in place of orange, in which case more sugar will be needed. (Serves six).

Scraped raw potatoes will give instant relief to a burn. As the potato becomes warm from the heat of the burn, change to a fresh slice and continue changing as long as necessary.
