About three weeks ago he was painting and finding the ladder he was standing on slipping he jumped and landed on the hook of a roof ladder which penetrated his foot. He paid little attention to it at first when blood poisoning set in and he lay unconscious for six days. As George is quite a favorite his many friends hope to soon see him out again.


