# OLD PUMPING AND IGNITION

We have considered valves and lubrication to offset oil pumping in engines. The next thing to consider is ignition. If an engine shows signs of oil entering the combustion chamber to a greater amount than normal, spark plugs will become fouled very quickly. It is therefore necessary to be sure that you have the right plugs for your particular car. Cheap and inferior spark plugs are of little use at any time and more especially so in an oil pump.

# Big Increase In Coal Shipments To Canada

(Canadian Press)  
WASHINGTON, August 25.—Figures given out by the coal division of the Department of Commerce show largely increased shipments of Welsh anthracite coal to Canada in 1924 as compared with 1923. The total in long tons shipped from Wales to Canada in 1924 was 219,629 as compared with 78,111 in 1923. This increase was made despite the fact that exports of Welsh anthracite for the entire world declined considerably in 1924 as compared with 1923.

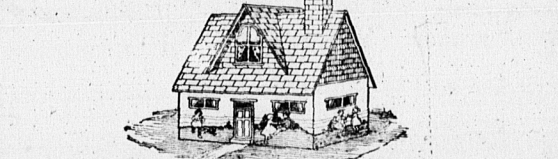
