Premier Bell Delivers His Budget Speech

Continued from Page One

The speaker dwelt at considerable length on the matter of the Dalton Sanatorium. The next matter was Government House. When the Liberal party came into power they found themselves saddled with a rental of \$1200 a year for the house occupied by the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The government held that the Dominion Government should pay the Lieutenant Governor a sufficient salary to pay his own rent, and they decided to make no provision for the maintenance of government house. The government had also adhered strictly to the system of giving contracts by tender. As a result many of their friends were disappointed but, he claimed, the government had saved money by it; they saved \$5,000 on coal alone for Falconwood Hospital. They had followed this system in the publication of the government reports. This was because the tender of the Guardian was the lowest bid by this system the Government had saved several thousands by it. They had increased taxation and, he continued, the condition of the province justified it. He claimed that the opposition had assented to the system of taxation and to the amount. Probably their assistance was given to get the government into a hole.

It had been contended, he said, that the government had no mandate to increase taxation. He claimed they had an equal mandate with the Meighen government, the mandate of a majority of the members and besides they had the mandate of necessity, necessity thrust upon them by their predecessors. He charged that the late government had spent money without the authority of the legislature, repeating the charge that they had created a deficit of \$250,000 and had spent \$10,000 manifestly for the purpose of winning the election. The government, he said, intended to carry on and they hoped and expected that next year they would be able to make a good financial showing as they did this year.

At 10.30 Mr. Bell intimated that perhaps he had already occupied too much time but there were some matters which he was desirous of placing before the House. He here went over a good deal of what he had already said, and in addition referring to the brightening prospects, the reduction in the cost of material, labor, etc. He concluded with the prediction that next year

O' L TANKER MAY BE ABANDONED

YARMOUTH, April 6.—Efforts to float the oil tanker Impoco, stranded on Blond Rock have proved unsuccessful. It is feared she will have to be abandoned. The Impoco went ashore about 7.30 Tuesday morning on Blond Rock, near Cape Sable while en route to St. John from Halifax with a consignment of gasoline.

The steamer left Halifax at 1.30 p. m. on Monday with bulk gasoline in her tanks equivalent to 30,000 barrels. She stuck fast on the ledge of rock and yesterday continued to grind heavily all day. Wireless messages were sent out at once for assistance and the C. G. S. Aberdeen and the steamer Imperial of the Imperial Oil Company's fleet on route from Colon, to Halifax, and at once proceeded to the rescue of the stranded steamer. The C. G. S. Aberdeen had to be secured through the local branch of the marine and fisheries department.

Students who attended McGill between the years 1908-1912 will recollect Miss Longworth for her brilliant academic record, her keen interest in sports, her social popularity and her genuinely friendly attitude towards her fellow students. In her senior year she was undergraduate president at the R. V. C. She too a prominent part in the senior play. At basketball and tennis she shined. She was counted as leading debater and public speaker, and when she graduated she did so with first class honors in English.

Miss Longworth was born in P. E. Island and had her early education at Prince Street School and Prince of Wales College. From the latter institution she graduated as leading pupil with the Governor General's Medal and a scholarship. After leaving McGill Miss Longworth taught at La Tuque and Westmount for several years before entering upon newspaper work.

It is understood that at present Miss Longworth is writing fiction and essays. No doubt but that in the near future the R. V. C. will have reason to be proud of this distinguished graduate.

The above is taken from the McGill News, of March, Miss Longworth referred to is a daughter of the late Colonel John Longworth, and she has already distinguished herself as a journalist. No doubt now that she is writing fiction and essays, she will likely win a place among the famous writers of Canada.
