**TABLE OILCLOTH**  
If you use oilcloth on your kitchen table it is well to invest in four brass corners that can be put on after the new oilcloth is tacked down. They present a nice appearance besides preventing the oilcloth from wearing out at the corners long before the rest is worn.

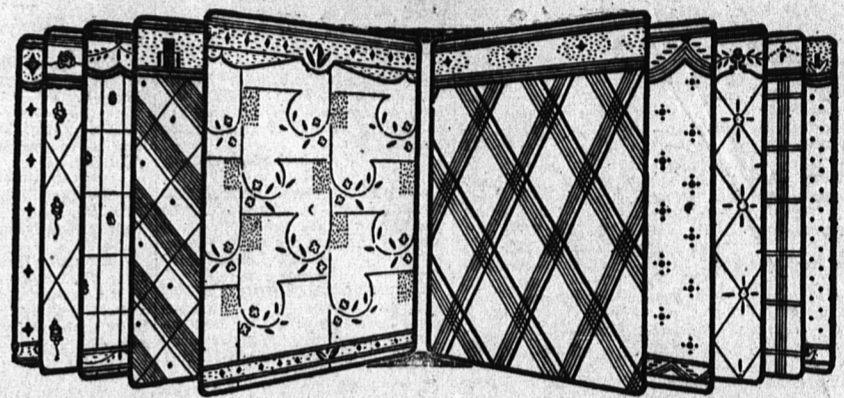
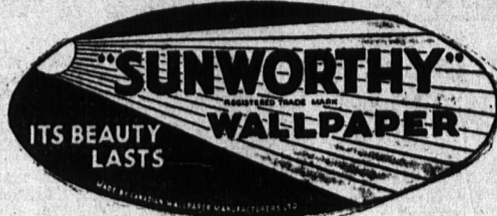
#### Personals

Dear Dorothy Dix—I married an ideal man or so it seemed to me. Two children came. My husband fell ill. For years he was a semi-invalid. I nursed him, waited on him, wore myself to a frazzle trying to help him for ten years. He swore over and over that if he was ever well he would make it all up to me. Finally the doctors discovered the cause of his illness and he was restored to health. How did my husband repay my devotion? By falling head over heels in love with another woman. I am stunned, wounded, embittered. I am returning cruelly for cruelty to him. I nag him to madness. I won't let him out of my sight. I dominate him and torture him. I have borrowed the devil's pitchfork. In the end—what is there any help for me? I still love him. He could cure my sick soul, but will he? A NAGGING WIFE.

Answer: Nothing could be more tragic or more piteous than your experience. Nothing else so devastates the soul as to find out that one has sacrificed one's life to an ingrate, nothing such a blighting disappointment as to find out that those one has loved and trusted have betrayed one.

It kills our faith in all that we have believed. It curdles the milk of human kindness and leaves life dust and ashes on our lips.  
But the remedy for soul sickness is not bitterness. It is not cruelty. It is not revenge. It is not in trying to make another suffer as we have suffered. It consists in forgiving, if that is possible, the offense that has

been committed against you, and, if you cannot forgive, to forget it and put it out of your mind as much as possible.

When you spend your time thinking of things to do to torture your husband you are just turning the knife in the wound and hurting yourself far more than you hurt him. When you brood over the return he has made for all your love and tenderness, labor and sacrifice, you are pressing to your own lips the cup of gall that is bitter than any you can force him to drink. You can never find peace, you can never know happiness as long as you dwell upon your wrongs. And so I beg you for your own sake to either go away and leave your husband, or to make a truce with him.

And if you still want him back the only way you will get him will be as an angel of forgiveness, not a demon of revenge.
