ENGINES FOR AFRICA.

After Being Severely Tested at Aldershot, Twenty four are to be Sent To The Front.

LONDON, Nov. 1.—There was an extraordinary military parade at Aldershot yesterday when fifteen traction engines and forty trucks were inspected previous to their departure for South Africa. A stretch of sandy, rocky road was selected for the tests and gave an excellent chance to observe the points of the engines. A steep ditch and banks two and three feet high were safely traversed. Though at times the wheels sank axle-deep, other engines pulled-out the hapless one. The Duke of Connaught, Princess Louise, and Victor Napoleon, who attended the trials were much pleased with the result. Twenty-four of these engines will be despatched to South Africa.

Confident of McKinley's Re election.

CHICAGO, Nov. 1.—"There is no doubt in my mind that the Republican party will win a decisive victory during the next Presidential campaign," said Representative Mann of Chicago today. "The elections in Kentucky, Iowa, Nebraska, and Ohio have no bearing whatever on the national campaign, and the results will not be an indication of what will happen next year. Local issues of more or less importance figure in the elections of these States, and for that reason I do not see how the results can be construed as having any bearing on the Presidential campaign. It is true, however, if the Republicans should win in Nebraska, Bryan would be more or less overshadowed, but at the same time he would be the nominee of the Democratic party. If the Democrats should happen to win in Ohio, Senator Hanna would be placed in the background to some extent and some of the Republicans would perhaps be frightened at such a result, but next year it will be found President McKinley will be the nominee of the Republican party and Ohio will come to his support."

SIXTY DAYS IN A COFFIN.

Remarkable Case of Suspended Animation Produced for the Benefit of a Traveller.

India is preeminently the land of mystery, and our most advanced magicians have never been able to reproduce all their marvellous performances. Once it was the writer's good fortune to be able to witness one of these remarkable cases of voluntary suspended animation of which he had so frequently heard, with a dubious smile, it must be admitted.

It was called a "Joghee" performance, and took place before the Maharajah of Dhurbanga, whose guest the writer had the honor to be. The "Joghee" was put by his disciples into a trance. He became perfectly unconscious and dead to all appearances. An English doctor present felt his pulse and found it had ceased, and a looking-glass showed not the slightest moisture of any breath in the body.

The "Joghee" was put into a coffin, the lid screwed on, and seals were impressed on it with the Maharajah's signet ring. The box was buried five feet deep, earth thrown in, and well stamped. Grain was then sown and trusted sentries guarded the place. The grain had sprouted and borne corn when the party was invited again, after sixty days, to witness the resurrection of the body.

The grave was opened and the coffin found to be intact. The seals were broken, the lid unscrewed, and the "Joghee" was taken out stark. His disciples now began to manipulate the body and to go through certain rites, similar to mesmerism, and by degrees the dead man opened his eyes, a quiver ran through his body, and he sat up erect.—Dublin Herald.

The organizers of the Continental Telegraph, Telephone and Cable Company, recently incorporated in New Jersey, have obtained control of all the independent telephone companies in the United States, and aim to combine these with the great telegraph companies and the five Atlantic cable companies. The capitalists interested in the venture, include George J. Gould, John Jacob Astor, William C. Whitver, P. A. B. Widener and William L. E. Kings. Verification of the story was obtained last night from Mr. Widener at his home in Ogontz.

CONNECT WITHOUT CABLES

Wireless Telegraphy to be Used for Communicating Between Five of the Hawaiian Islands.

NEW YORK, Nov. 1, 1899. Telegraphic communication by Sig. Marconi's wireless system is to be established between five of the Hawaiian islands by a company of Americans. These islands have never been electrically connected.

Frederick J. Cross of the firm of Cattan, Neil & Co., engineers of Honolulu, who is now in this city, has closed a contract for the American company in Hawaii.

Although many engineers regarded the connection of the five islands by cable as impracticable, because of coral reefs on which a cable is soon covered with coral growth, breaks are frequent and repairs exceedingly difficult, the American company had about decided to attempt it, as the needs of telegraphic communication had become urgent.

The they heard of Sig. Marconi's achievements, and Mr. Cross was sent to this country to view the working of his system during the international yacht races. He found that the Marconi system would cost much less, and be more practical in many ways than a cable.

Regular telegraph business will be done by the company installing the wireless system. The distances over which communication will be established will vary from eight to 60 miles.

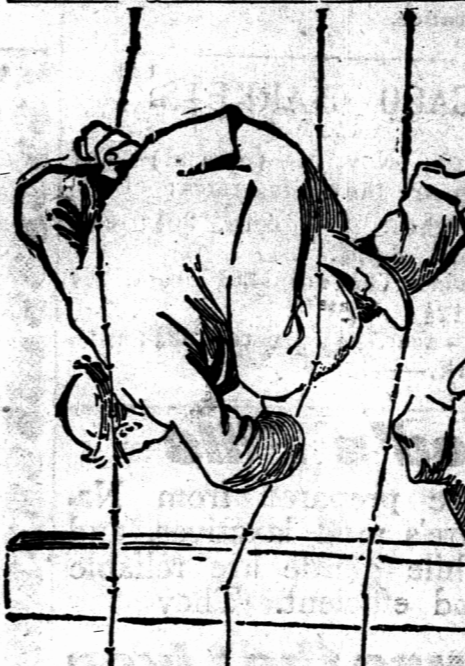

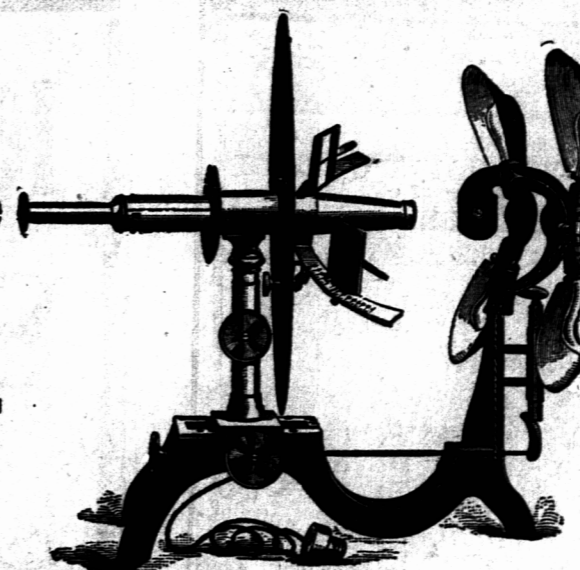
