German Credentials Now Being Examined

VERSAILLES, May 2.—The French official statement on the ceremony of the peace congress today says that the president of the committee on verification of credentials of the "inter-allied conference, Jules Cambon and the other members, Henry White, Lord Harding and Baron Matsui were received at 3.15 o'clock today at Trainon Palace by Count von Brockdorff Rantzau, president of the German delegation. The German credentials were given to M. Cambon who handed over in exchange the credentials established by the Allied and associated powers. The German delegates then retired. The respective committees will now examine the credentials submitted to them.

PARIS, May 2.—Information coming from French sources tonight is that a secret plenary session of the peace conference probably will be held Saturday, and the meeting with the Germans for the handing over of the peace treaty Monday afternoon.

Military Party To Support Foch

PARIS, May 2.—Assuming that the Clemenceau ministry will be dissolved soon after the termination of the peace delegations, a military party, designed to support the aims of Marshal Foch, has made its appearance on the French political stage.

Labor Riots Cause Death

PARIS, May 2.—During the course of the day, 80 policemen were wounded in riots, and 50 arrests were made. Among those slightly injured were Loon Jouxhaux, General Secretary of the Federation of Labor, and Deputy Poncet. A young man was killed in the Opera. Fifteen persons were wounded, and several of them seriously, in the neighborhood of the Gare de Lev, when crowds stoned the cavalry and many shots were fired.

Bolsheviki Evacuate Petrograd

HELSINGFORS, May 8.—Petrograd is being evacuated by the Bolsheviki. Reports from reliable sources say many of the inhabitants are being sent away, and the Bolsheviki government is taking rigorous measures to prevent the news of the happenings at Olontz from reaching the people.

Canadians in Imperial Army to Get Expenses

OTTAWA, May 2.—Mr. Ballantine replying to a question by Mr. Sinclair said the number of active service ratings in the Canadian Army, April 15 was officers 200, men 1753, total 1953.

The early part of the war Mr. Nicholson called the attention of the minister of militia to the fact that Canadians who enlisted in the Imperial Army and were discharged have no means of returning to Canada. Mr. Mewburn replied ten days ago. He requested the Overseas Minister of Militia to make arrangements with the War Office for repatriation at the expense of the Dominion Government of all Canadians in the Imperial Army. PARIS, May 3.—The Council of Three today settled the status of the Kiel Canal. Germany probably will retain proprietorship of the waterway but tolls for passage through it will be levied under international control.

Italian Troops Land in Dalmatia

ROME, May 3.—Italian troops are reported to have been landed in Dalmatia. An important conference was held at the Italian foreign office today between Premier Orlando, Baron Sonnino, Thomas Nelson Page, United States ambassador to Italy, and the French Ambassador Camille Barer. It is hinted semi-officially that the conference may have been preliminary to a resumption of relations between the Italian delegation and the Peace Conference. Ambassador Barer also conferred yesterday with Orlando.

Metagama Arrives At Quebec with Soldiers and Families

QUEBEC, May 3.—Bringing mostly repatriated Canadian soldiers who were returning home with their English born wives and babies the Canadian Pacific steamer Metagama docked at Quebec this afternoon about four o'clock. The ship was thronged by many thousands of relatives, friends and citizens that crowned the waterfront to welcome home the first batch of soldiers to land at Quebec this summer. The party that the Metagama brought to Quebec today numbered between four and five hundred officers and soldiers the rest of the group was formed of the wives and families of the men.
