Potato Ring Rot Is Being Fought

Due to work carried on by Science Service, Dominion Department of Agriculture, the number of rejections in Canada on account of bacterial ring rot entered for certification continues to decrease. Dominion and Provincial Departments of Agriculture employees in all provinces continue to look out for ring rot and report every case observed. In most provinces, these reports are followed by a visit to the farm where the diseased crop was produced and steps taken to eradicate the disease. The Department of Agriculture of Alberta, Manitoba, New Brunswick and Ontario are now making surveys for bacterial ring rot every season in some of their commercial potato growing areas, and steps taken to eradicate the disease. Some good results have been obtained but a more thorough and energetic program should be undertaken immediately everywhere, says the report. There are reasons to believe that the Provinces of Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia and British Columbia remain substantially free from ring rot.

OVERSEAS EDUCATORS TO TEACH IN BRITAIN

LONDON, Sept. 26. (CP)—Members of the Dominions and United States forces stationed in England who were teachers before the war are to be given an opportunity to teach in British schools if their qualifications conform to ministry of education standards. Under a scheme recently announced, servicemen from overseas may, if they wish, go back to school for two or three weeks then, after their "refresher" course, go into schools, solicitors' offices, hospitals and technical colleges. 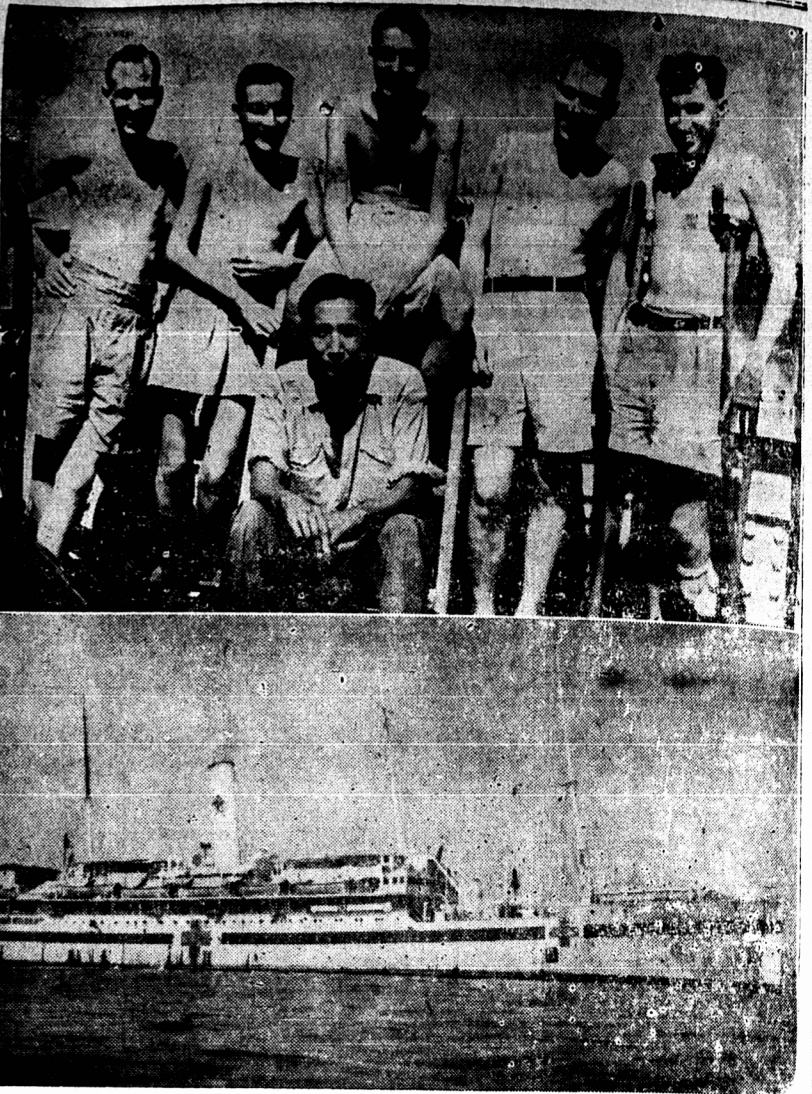
