AEROPLANE SERVICE EVERY FOUR HOURS MONTREAL-NEW YORK

MONTREAL, Nov. 16.—A four-hour aerial service between Montreal and New York was announced here to-night by Charles D. Stearns, local district manager of Canadian Colonial Airways Ltd. Mr. Stearns stated that planes will leave here daily at 12:15 p. m., except Sunday, and arrive in New York at 4:15. This includes a stop-off at Albany for the transfer of mails and passengers arriving from points east and west, or scheduled to connect with machines leaving in either of these directions.
