 Notes on the Prince Edward Island Egg Laying Contest for the week ending Nov. 21, 1930.

Mr. William Sansom's B. R. pen 11 led the contest for the week with 31 eggs, 51 points; The Experimental Farm, Charlottetown, B. R. pen 7 were second with 33 eggs, 26.4 points; Mr. John B. Poole's W. L. pen 3 were third with 22 eggs, 22.3 points.

Mr. William Sansom's B. R. pen No. 5 leads the contest for individual production with 16 eggs, 15.8 points and his hen No. 4 is second with 15 eggs, 13.9 points; The Experimental Farm, Charlottetown, hen No. 4 in pen 7 is third with 14 eggs, 13.8 points.

Pen 11 owned by Wm. Sansom,

leads the contest with 65 eggs, 62.6 points; The Experimental Farm, Charlottetown, pen 7 is second with 62 eggs, 48.9 points; Mr. James Tuplin's B. R. pen is third with 55 eggs, 44.9 points.

The production for the week was 258 and to date 504.  
 Thirty-three eggs were disqualified for being under weight.  
 One hundred and twenty hens have yet to lay their first egg.

**THE LATE DUNCAN**  
 D. MACDONALD

With the death in Charlottetown early Monday morning, shortly after midnight, of Mr. Duncan D. MacDonald, a veteran railway man has been gathered to his fathers at the advanced age of 78 years.  
 The late Mr. MacDonald possessed a splendid physique and had apparently been enjoying excellent health until two weeks ago when he was stricken with heart disease to which he succumbed despite the best medical skill and devoted attention on the part of his wife and family, his daughter, Mrs. Blood, of Bridgewater, Mass., coming home to nurse her father in his last illness.

Mr. MacDonald was born in Dundas and was a son of the late Norman MacDonald. He first entered the service of the railway in 1874 and worked on the construction of the line. He was employed as section man at Morell for eight years and was section foreman at St. Peter's Bay for twenty-seven years. In 1909 he was transferred to Georgetown and continued as foreman there until 1922 when he retired on superannuation. He was therefore continuously engaged in railway work for forty-eight years. He came to reside in Charlottetown in May, 1929.

During his long career he had a number of snow battles to fight during winters when severe storms swept over this Island, adding greatly to the difficulties of the railway men. In one winter, for instance, at a point east of St. Peter's the snow

had drifted to a depth of thirty feet, fences and tall trees being completely submerged.  
 Two washouts also occurred at St. Peter's Bay during the years Mr. MacDonald was foreman there, the railway track built along the shore of the bay being destroyed for about a quarter of a mile. It was several weeks before the damage was repaired and during that time the train from Charlottetown ran daily to the point where the washout occurred, the freight and passengers being transferred to a train on the other side of the break. On two occasions the breastwork built to protect the land was carried away by disastrous storms.

Mr. MacDonald was also one of the veteran pipers of Prince Edward Island and was a fine specimen of humanity. In full Highland costume he was a familiar and impressive figure at Caledonia games in this province. He was a member of the Caledonia Club and frequently played for functions held by that organization.

This autumn he had the honor of being one of the fifty six pipers who were present from all parts of Canada, the United States and Scotland at the Caledonia games in Banff, Alberta.

The late Mr. MacDonald was a worthy descendant of the Highland pioneers of this province, inheriting from them their independence and sterling qualities of mind and heart. In St. Peter's and Georgetown, where he resided for so many years, and in Charlottetown during his residence of a year and a half he had made many friends. He was town councillor of Georgetown for four years, acting mayor, and a member of the board of school trustees.

Mr. MacDonald was twice married first to the late Ida Banks. They had two children, the late Mrs. Roy B. Harding, of Bridgewater, Mass., and Mrs. Bertram M. Blood of the same city who is at present in Charlottetown.

Mr. MacDonald's second wife (nee Esther Howlett, of Annandale) survives him together with three sons: Lorne in Chicago, Norman in Georgetown, also one daughter Florence in Charlottetown. Another son, Percy, died in Georgetown about fourteen years ago.  
 One brother and sister survive, Hugh MacDonald, in California and Mrs. Edward Turner in Montague.

Mr. MacDonald was a member of the United Church, and service at his home last evening was conducted by Rev. Dr. Ramsay, Rev. Dr. Vincent, Rev. C. N. Brown, and Rev. J. M. MacLeod, formerly of St. Peter's Bay.

The body was taken yesterday to Dundas where burial took place in the afternoon.  
 To the bereaved relatives the Guardian extends its deep sympathy.

**MR. SYDNEY WRIGHT CURRIE**

Besides his loving wife formerly Clara Reigh he leaves to mourn three small children also one brother William Currie, of Roxbury, Mass. and one sister, Mrs. Ernest White, of Vancouver, B. C. Deceased was the son of the late Archibald Currie of Souris, P. E. I.
