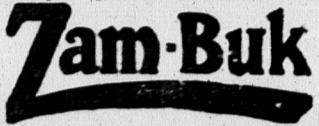

THE WAR CHARITIES ACT, 1917.

Department of The Secretary of State of Canada

The War Charities Act, 1917, defines "war charities" as follows: "any fund, institution or association, other than a church or the Salvation Army, whether established before or after the commencement of this Act, having for its objects or among its objects the relief of suffering or distress, or the supplying of needs or comforts to sufferers from the war, or to soldiers, returned soldiers or their families or dependents, or any other charitable purpose connected with the present European war. Any question whether a charity is a war charity shall be finally determined by the Minister.

The Act also provides: (1) It shall not be lawful to make any appeal to the public for donations or subscriptions in money or in kind for any war charity as hereinbefore defined, or to raise or attempt to raise money for any such war charity by promoting any bazaar, sale, entertainment or exhibition, or by any similar means, unless— (a) the war charity is either exempted from registration or is registered under this Act; and (b) the approval in writing of the executive committee or other governing body of the war charity has been obtained, either directly or through some person duly authorized to give such approval on behalf of such governing body; and if any person contravenes any of the provisions of this section he shall be guilty of an offence against this Act.

(2) This section shall not apply to any collection at Divine Service in a place of public worship. The Act was assented to on the 20th of September, 1917, and the above section so far as it relates to registration is applicable to War Charities on the 20th of December, 1917. After that date, collections made otherwise than on behalf of a registered War Charity by subscriptions, donations, bazaars, sales, entertainments, exhibitions or similar means of collecting money are illegal.

**JUDGMENTS IN EXEMPTION APPEALS**

The following decisions have been given by His Lordship the Chief Justice, Appeal Judge for Prince County under the Military Service Act:—

**Raymond O'Halloran:**  
Judgment: Appeal dismissed. Judgment of Local Tribunal confirmed. It appearing that the applicant was accustomed to devote a considerable part of his time to work not essential to agricultural production and that his father and other members of his family are quite capable of working effectively all the land they hold.

**Manuel Geneau:**  
Judgment: Appeal dismissed. Judgment of Local Tribunal confirmed. It being considered that the father with the other members of the family (not in Class A) are capable of working the farm effectively. The assignment of lease referred to is considered colorable only, and purposed to avoid military service.

**George Urville Ellands:**  
Judgment: Appeal dismissed. It being considered that the father with other members of the family (not in Class A) are capable of working the farm effectively and that his place can be filled by others.

**Fidele Arseneault:**  
Judgment: Appeal allowed. It being considered: (1) That he is an engaged in agriculture and in labour essential to agricultural production (2) That he is the sole support of an infirm mother upwards of 70 years of age and of feeble minded brother and serious hardship would ensue if he were placed on active service.

**Albert Thompson:**  
Judgment: Appeal sustained and exemption allowed until he ceases to be employed in agricultural labour essential to production.

**John Willard Ramsay:**  
Judgment: Appeal dismissed and judgment of Local Tribunal sustained allowing exemption until 1st Dec. 1918 by reason of domestic position.

**Alva Baglole:**  
Judgment: Appeal dismissed and judgment of Local Tribunal confirmed. It being considered that his work is not essential to agricultural production but that his place can be filled by others.

**George Frederick L. Inman:**  
Judgment: Appeal allowed. It being considered: (1) That appellant is and has been habitually and effectively engaged in agricultural production. (2) That serious hardship would ensue if he were placed on active service owing to his exception at domestic position, being the sole support of his mother now 75 years of age her only other son being now on active military service in the Canadian Overseas Forces.

**Wallace William McArthur:**  
Judgment: Appeal dismissed. Judgment of Local Tribunal sustained. It being considered that the father and other members of the family (not in Class A) are quite capable of working the farm effectively and that appellant's work is not essential to agricultural production.

**Thomas Franklin Birch:**  
Judgment: Appeal dismissed. Judgment of Local Tribunal confirmed. It being considered that appellant's father with other members of the family (not in Class A) are capable of effectively working the farm and that appellant's present employment is not essential to agricultural production.

**Louis Bernard:**  
Judgment: Appeal dismissed. Judgment of Local Tribunal confirmed. It being considered that appellant's father and other members of the family (not in Class A) are capable of effectively cultivating the farm and that his place can be filled by others.

**Albert Baglole:**  
Judgment: Appeal dismissed. Judgment of Local Tribunal confirmed. It being considered that the father with other members of the family (exempted or not in Class A) are capable of effectively operating the farms in question.

**Augustine Arseneault:**  
Judgment: Appeal dismissed on the grounds: (1) The appellant has been accustomed to devote a considerable proportion of his time to work not connected with agricultural production and that his father and other members of the family (not in Class A) are capable of managing and cultivating all the land which they occupy as efficiently as in former years and that the appellant's place can be filled by others without necessary loss of production.

**Frank Edmond Doiron:**  
Judgment: Appeal dismissed. Judgment of Local Tribunal sustained allowing exemption until 30th June 1918. The appellant is a teacher in one of the public schools of this province. His year's employment ends 30th June 1918 when his place can be filled by some other not eligible for military service.

**William George Pickering:**  
Judgment: Appeal dismissed. Judgment of Local Tribunal confirmed; it being considered that appellant's employment upon active military service is more important than his present work as a producer and that his place may be filled effectively by others not eligible for military service.

**Kenneth Alex McClure:**  
Judgment: Appeal allowed and exemption granted whilst appellant continues to be effectively employed in agricultural labour essential to production.

**Chester Campbell:**  
Judgment: Appeal dismissed and exemption disallowed. Appellant having been sent for re-examination by Medical Board and again classified in Category "A" by them; and it not appearing that in the national interest he should be continued in his occupation as a jeweller, or that serious hardship will ensue to his employer by his being placed on active service.

**William Ernest Clow:**  
Judgment: Appeal dismissed and exemption disallowed. It appearing that he is not the sole support of his father and mother and their family, and that otherwise he has no claim for exemption.

**Samuel Kennedy Todd:**  
Judgment: Appeal allowed and exemption allowed until he ceases to be effectively employed as a bank clerk competent for his work. It appearing that appellant is at present a competent person effectively engaged in banking service and who in the national interest it is expedient to exempt.

**Arthur Henry Bell:**  
Judgment: Appeal allowed and exemption of appellant allowed by reason of domestic position until the 1st day of April 1918. It appearing that the business engaged in is not essential to the national service and that this is only a question of domestic position, and that this son is his father's sole support, and that appellant's half pay will be available if necessary for such support. But on account of father's eagerness this time is given him to provide a substitute for his son.

**Ernest Foster:**  
Judgment: Appeal dismissed and exemption of appellant—disallowed. It appearing that the father with his son (sent away for a time as local Tribune adjudged) can work his farm productively, and that appellant does not continuously work in agricultural production.

**Herbert Mahar:**  
Judgment: Appeal dismissed and exemption of appellant—disallowed. It appearing that the father with his son (sent away for a time as local Tribune adjudged) can work his farm productively, and that appellant does not continuously work in agricultural production.

**Stewart Henry:**  
Judgment: Appeal sustained and exemption allowed until he ceases to be employed in agricultural labour essential to production. It appearing that he is a necessary agricultural labourer on the 40 acre farm of his father, (the keeper of the Marine Pox hospital) and that he is an habitual agricultural labourer with a brother the American Army.

**James Edward Blanchard:**  
Judgment: Appeal allowed and appellant allowed exemption by reason of financial obligations until the 1st July 1918. It appearing that his business obligations require that he have that time to settle them.

**Joseph Clifford Dunn:**  
Judgment: Appeal dismissed and exemption disallowed. It not appearing that appellant's labour is essential to agricultural production on his father's farm, and it appearing that his place can be filled by others of his family now residing on it.

**Louis F. Byrne:**  
Judgment: Appeal dismissed. Judgment of Local Tribunal confirmed. It not being considered that his occupation as a teacher in this country school is one of national importance and that others, either older men or women, could take his place as such teacher.

**Henry Hett Richards:**  
Judgment: Appeal of Military Representative disallowed and decision of Local Tribunal confirmed, adding "o" to the words "in work essential to production." It appearing that appellant owns his farm of 90 acres, worked productively, and that his labour is essential to its production; the fact that his father, (aged 65, with varicose veins and weak knees) and another brother work the adjoining farm of 110 acres, also productively, not being deemed to affect appellant's right to exemption.

**John Leo Praught:**  
Second Medical History Sheet, on his son, for re-examination, again puts him in Category "A."  
Judgment: Appeal dismissed and judgment of Local Tribunal confirmed. It not appearing that appellant's labour is essential to agricultural production on this farm, and it appearing that his place can be filled by others of his family now residing on it.

**John Joseph Callaghan:**  
Judgment: Appeal sustained and exemption disallowed. It appearing that he is not a person habitually and effectively engaged in labour essential to agricultural production but rather as a railroad employee.

**Andrew Eshing Dollar:**  
Judgment: Appeal allowed and exemption allowed until he ceases to be employed in agricultural labour essential to production. It appearing that though his three brothers (married men) have adjoining farms of their own, and productive, the appellant is needed with his father, aged 75, on his farm of 110 acres.

**Arthur Emerson Warren:**  
Judgment: Appeal allowed, and

ordered that exemption be allowed until Class II is called out by Proclamation. It appearing that with another son, aged 17, he is at present necessary on his mother's farm and in the successful conduct and operation of a flour and grist mill and carding mill of long standing in the community, and in such occupation it is not in the national interest that appellant should now be withdrawn from military service.

**James Henry Wares:**  
Judgment: Appeal allowed and appellant exempted until Class II is called out. It appearing that appellant was for some time and a half months on home duty in Halifax, returning to farm last year, but that his going into immediate service might now cause unnecessary hardship to his father, aged 70, working farm of 104 acres.

**IMPORTANT CHANGES IN TRAIN SCHEDULE**

General Time Changes on Canadian Government Railways on January 6th:

**MARITIME EXPRESS WILL BE THE DAILY THROUGH TRAIN**

Important changes in the train schedules of the Canadian Government Railways will go into effect on January 6th, 1918.

The Ocean Limited now running between Montreal and Halifax will after that date leave Montreal daily except Sunday at 6.40 p. m. instead of at 7.00 p. m., and arrive at Halifax daily except Sunday at 11.40 p. m. The Westbound Ocean Limited will leave Halifax daily except Sunday at 7.43 a. m. and arrive in Montreal at 9.45 a. m. daily except Monday.

The Maritime Express will be the daily through train, leaving Montreal at 9.25 a. m. and arriving at Halifax at 4.00 p. m., and leaving Halifax westbound at 3.00 p. m. and arriving in Montreal at 7.40 p. m. It will be seen that the schedules of both trains have been lengthened slightly so as to give a little more running time during the period of difficult operating conditions.

The new time table will not greatly affect the local train service, and but few changes are predicted in the branch lines, excepting to alter the schedules of the connecting trains with the through expresses.

The service between Prince Edward Island and the mainland is now via Cape Tormentine, and on and after December 31st the car ferry "Prince Edward Island" will leave Port Borden, P. E. I. after the arrival of the morning express trains from Charlottetown and Summerside, and arrive at Cape Tormentine to connect with a train leaving there at 10.20 a. m. and arriving at Sackville at 12.05 noon, connecting there with the Ocean Limited westbound, and with No. 13 express for Truro. The afternoon passenger train to connect with the steamer will leave Sackville at 1.00 p. m. arriving at Cape Tormentine at 2.30 p. m. affording a connection for passengers for the Island on trains No. 199, 4 and 18.

The changes of January 6th will also bring about the start of a direct passenger service between Quebec
